Richmond County Negro Agent S. N. Shelton points out that since there is very little possibility that Stanback will ever get an increase in cash crop acreage, he decided that raising hogs would be a good cash supplement.

At present, Stanback is feeding his hogs mostly "store stuff", but he says that he has learned enough about hogs to know that they need pasture, corn, protein supplement, and plenty of cool water.
