## Coastal Bermuda Let Swine Business Grow

Callie Stanback, Negro farm owner of Rockingham, Route 3, says "selling a few hogs now and then means a lot to a farmer's pocketbook." He adds that this is especially true when the farmer only has three acres of cotton and two-tenths acre of tobacco.

Richmond County Negro Agent S. N. Shelton points out that since there is very little possibility that Stanback will ever get an increase in cash crop acreage, he decided that raising hogs would be a good cash supplement.

Pasture production has been a limited factor but now that Coastal Bermuda grass is coming into its own, Stanback figures he'll be able to expand his hog business.

At present, Stanback is feeding his hogs mostly "store stuff," but he says that he has learned enough about hogs to know that they need pasture, corn, protein supplement, and plenty of cool water.

Shelton feels that other farmers with small acreage might be able to step up their livestock production by growing Coastal Bermuda.
