### Catawba Indians Host Powerful East Carolina This Week

Catawba's Indians, fresh from a 12-6 upset of highly regarded Newberry last weekend, takes on East Carolina's powerful Bucs this Saturday night at Salisbury. This is the game of the week in the tough North State Conference.

East Carolina, regarded by many as the team to beat in the North State this season, lost last weekend 7-6 to Lenoir-Rhyne's up-and-coming Bears at Greenville. Thus with star passer Dick Cherry in fine shape, the game at Shuford field on the Catawba campus shapes up as one of the state's better contests this week.

Saturday's contest will be Catawba's first in family play. They lost by 26-0 to Davidson in the season opener, then traveled to Newberry last Saturday to edge the Redskins 12-6. The week before, Newberry downed Furman 14-0.

Coach Clyde Biggers was apparently well pleased with his club's performance at Newberry.

Rated among the darkhorses in the tough seven-team loop this season, the game Saturday will go a long way towards determining the fate of the Indians in the loop chase.

Biggers will probably open with the same lineup which trimmed Newberry. That would read Fred Sisy and Bob McKelvey at ends; Dick Garland and Gary Sherrill at tackles; Ralph Yarborough and Dick Gassels at guards; CHERRYVILLE'S HAL QUINN at center with Sonny Butler, Dickie Smith, Les Swanner, and Pete Cerocci in the backfield.

Another neighboring North State eleven will be action against non-loop competition. Lenoir-Rhyne hosts strong Newberry. Tackle Gene Frye's extra point gave the Hickorians their 7-6 nod last week with Harold Bullard, Walter Cornwell, and Bill Ackard leading the offense. The Bears will be favored but Newberry is dangerous.

Another NSC scrap comes off at Burlington with Elon facing Appalachian. The Apps will be seeking revenge for the 7-6 licking last weekend at the hands of Western Carolina. Elon will be

making their initial league start. Coach Norman Harris, beaming with smiles following the Gardner-Webbers' weekend triumph over Mars Hill, takes the Bulldogs to Cullowhee Friday night to hit the Western Carolina Jayvees.

### Mountaineers Spank Ironmen 28-0 Friday

Kings Mountain's rough Mountaineers pushed over one touchdown in each quarter here Friday night to defeat Cherryville 28-0 before a good crowd at the local park. The defeat was the third in a row for Cherryville following an opening victory over Mt. Holly.

The Ironmen took the opening kickoff and with star Ronald Turner running at full steam, moved into Mountaineer territory but Stu Carlton's rock defense stopped the locals on the 40. Taking the punt on their own four yard line after drawing a 15 yard penalty for clipping, the visitors struck in two plays for the game's first touchdown. Meral Valentine, the big 190 pound fullback, picked up 15 on the first play with John McGinnis, the unsung hero of the Kings Mountain club's three victories thus far, then taking a hand-off from Quarterback George Harris, raced off tackle, broke into the clear, and sped 81 yards to pay dirt. Tackle J. L. Stewart place kicked the extra point.

In the second period, Valentine intercepted a Roy Dagerhart pass and the Mountaineers went 36 yards for a touchdown with Jerry McCarter going over from the three. Again Stewart's kick split the uprights for a 14-0 KM halftime lead.

Carlton's forces took the second half kick-off and moved 69 yards to pay territory. Valentine, McCarter, McGinnis, and Harris sparked the drive which required 14 plays. Valentine scored from the 10 with Stewart kicking the point after. Buddy Smith and Joe Ormand, a pair of staunch defenders for the winners, blocked a Cherryville punt in the end zone

### Shelby TD Favorite For 7:30 Tilt

One of the oldest and keenest rivalries in the Tar Heel state is carded for this weekend when Shelby meets Cherryville under the lights here. A packed house is expected for the 7:30 bout Friday.

Coaches Casey Morris and Lloyd Little have their Lions in a five-way tie for first place in the Southwest AA loop at present with a 1-0 mark with Cherryville in the basement with a mark of no wins, three losses. Anything, however, can happen in high school football and usually does in this heated series. Shelby will be favored by a touchdown.

Their ranks deflated by graduation last spring, Coaches Morris and Little were forced to search for new talent. They opened the season with a 21-0 defeat at the hands of a good Hickory eleven, looked anything but the Southwest champs of last season. After an open date, however, the Shelbians came back last week to register a 25-13 decision over Rutherford Central at home. Morris, Puse, Tommy Harold, and Al Estridge were the stars of the Central win with Estridge scoring three times.

Operating from the single wing, Shelby has one of the lightest, shiftest teams in the circuit. The local Ironmen have also been scouted by the Lion mentors on three occasions. Wayne McSwain and Johnny Aull top Shelby on defense.

Roy Dagerhart, Ronald Turner, Darrell Carpenter, Paul Ginn and Paul Taylor were all injured in the Kings Mountain bout but Dagerhart, Turner, Carpenter, and Ginn are expected to be ready for Shelby. Carroll Carpenter will again open at the fullback slot with Vance Schrum at guard, Larry Kilby at tackle.

Turner needs but 225 yards to reach the 1,000 figure in total offense. Against Mt. Holly, Belmont, Lincolnton, and Kings Mountain, the speedy tailback has accounted for 775 yards.

### Three Games On Tap In Southwest Circuit This Week

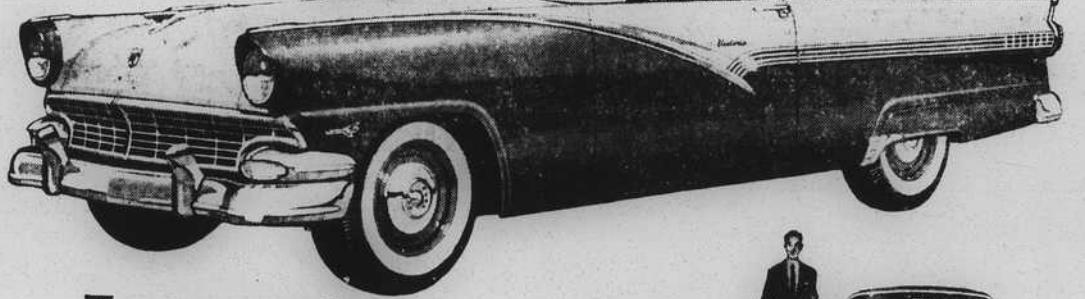

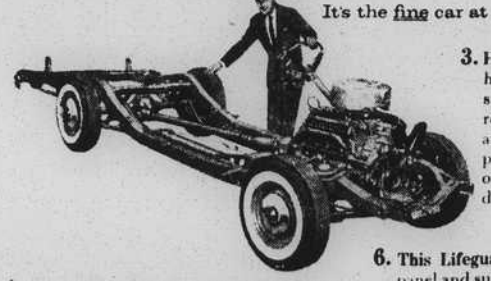

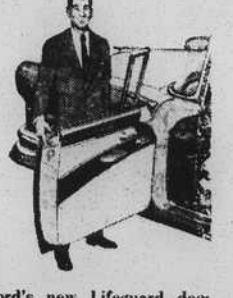
