Airman Dale Q. Hendricks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hobson Hendricks of Cherryville is currently enrolled in Air Base Defense Training with the United States Air Force at Parks AFB, California. In the course of 55 days training program, he will receive thorough field and bivouac training, including the use of the .45 caliber pistol, .30 cal carbine, .30 cal semi-automatic rifle, and other general subjects. The Air Base Defense School at Parks Air Force Base is the only one of its kind in the Air Force.
At the completion of his specialized training, Airman Hendricks will be sent to one of the numerous Air Force Bases throughout the world and assigned to Air Police duties. These duties include inspection, apprehension, escort, sentry door handlers, pass and identification section, Provost Marshal investigations, town patrol, Set. of the Guard and Desk Sergeant.

Airman Hendricks entered the Air Force on June 13, 1955 and received his basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas. Prior to his enlistment he attended the Cherryville High Schools in Cherryville.

FORT BRAGG — James H. Twitty, Jr., whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Twitty, reside at P. O. Box 282, Cherryville, N. C., has recently been assigned to the 187th Airborne Regimental Combat Team, Fort Bragg, North Carolina, for advance military training.

A former student at John Chavis A and T College, he has volunteered for parachute training but will be required to undergo routine advanced individual training prior to becoming a Paratrooper. Upon completion of the eight week ground course he will graduate to Airborne training, where he will be taught the techniques of making a parachute jump.
He will receive advanced military training under direction of men and officers of the famous 187th Airborne ACT which saw action in World War II and Korea. The 187th returned to the United States in July of this year by giant airlift from Japan under "Operation Gyroscope" after five years of duty in the Far East Theater.

Floyd E. Grigg Stationed in La.

FORT POLK, La. — Specialist Third Class Floyd E. Grigg, Jr., whose wife, Amanda, lives in Cowpens, S. C., is participating in the largest joint Army-Air Force maneuver since World War II, Exercise Sage Brush, in Louisiana.
Some 110,000 Army troops are testing the latest concepts of atomic, bacteriological, chemical and electronic warfare.
Specialist Grigg's unit, Battery B of the First Armored Division's 73rd Field Artillery Battalion, will be regularly stationed at Fort Polk, La.
Grigg's father lives on Route 2, Kings Mountain, N. C. He attended Bethware High School.

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Films Available At Gaston Library

The Gaston County Public Library will have the following 16mm sound films available for the period November 28-December 23rd. These films are of adult interest and suitable for program use. Any Club, Church, or Civic group wishing to use the films may make reservation by contacting Gaston County Public Library.

1. JEALOUSY. 30 minutes—sound—black and white.
A young wife, angered at her husband's late arrival home accuses him of infidelity. Later she learns that his excuse was valid and is overcome with a feeling of guilt because she has been flirting with a young man. She realizes jealousy is caused by her own imagination and dissatisfaction with homemaking.

2. JUSTICE UNDER LAW. 30 minutes—sound—black and white.
Emphasizes the ideal of justice under American law. Shows a prosecuting attorney fulfilled his duty to protect the innocent and punish the guilty. Also stresses the importance of weighing evidence carefully to prevent mob hysteria and to protect the individual's constitutional rights.

3. LUGANO. 10 minutes—sound—color.
The life and architecture of the city of Lugano, Switzerland; a boat trip over Lake Lugano; and a ride on the funicular to the top of Mount San Salvatore for a view of the surrounding region.

4. MOUNTAIN OF FIRE. 10 minutes—sound—color.
A highly dramatic portrayal of one of nature's most violent phenomena, the eruption of a volcano. Here Mt. Etna, the biggest

volcano in all Europe at her worst. Demonstrates deeply rooted characteristics of a people who react in an extraordinary manner to the idiosyncrasies of their environment. A strong illustration of a people's trust in God.

5. NORTHEAST USA — Maine Harbor Town. 20 minutes—sound—black and white.
In New England, the thin stony soil makes farming difficult. Fortunately, other resources can be developed to provide a livelihood. In this film, we see the Keller family, living near Camden, Maine, illustrate how the ingenuity of a people can supplement the income derived from farming rugged lands in a climate with a short growing season. We see them capitalizing on other natural resources.

6. PAINTING: LTRARNING TO USE YOUR BRUSH. 10 minutes—sound—black and white.
After introducing the idea that painting is fun and may be enjoyed by all age groups, the way to arrange all the necessary materials is demonstrated. The acquiring control of the brush, the strokes, may be combined in a variety of ways. Patterns for practice are shown.

First Lady's Pumpkin Chiffon Pie
Heads Congressional Club Recipes

In time for Thanksgiving and holiday festive menus is Mamie Doud Eisenhower's favorite recipe for pumpkin chifon pie. The First Lady contributed her pet recipe to the 1955 edition of the Congressional Club Cookbook.
The club in Washington, D. C. is an organization of congressional wives and women legislators. Their cookbook just off the press boasts personally handwritten favorites of almost 400 wives of senators, representatives, Supreme Court justices and cabinet members and of women legislators.
The cookbook recipes cover every section of the United States, Hawaii and Alaska. Priced at \$2.50 plus 25 cents for mailing, the cookbook may be ordered from the Congressional Club, 2001 New Hampshire Avenue, Washington, D. C.
Here is Mrs. Eisenhower's pumpkin chifon pie contribution.
Pumpkin Chifon Pie
3 beaten egg yolks 1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup brown sugar 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin 1 envelope Knox gelatin
1/2 cup milk 1 cup cold water
1/2 teaspoon salt 3 stiffly beaten egg whites
1/4 cup granulated sugar
Combine egg yolks, brown sugar, pumpkin, milk, salt and spice. Cook in double boiler until thick, stirring constantly. Soak gelatin in cold water, stir into hot mixture. Chill until partly set. Beat egg whites, add granulated sugar, and beat stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Pour into baked pie shell and chill until set. Garnish with whipped cream.
Makes one big pie or 8 individual pies.
