Domodossola, Italy, Sept. 23.— The great feat of crossing the snow-capped Alpine barrier between Swit-zerland and Italy in a heavier-thanair machine was accomplished today by George Chavez, the young Peru-vian aviator.

The plucky hero of the exploit,

however, lies in the Domodossola hospital badly injured as the result of an accident that occurred just as of an accident that occurred just as he had completed the most arduous and nerve-racking portion of a task he had snt out to accomplish—a flight from Brig, in Switzerland, across the Alps to Milan, in Italy, in all a distance of about 72 miles.

Both his legs are broken, his left

thigh is fractured and his body is badly contused, but his physicians are of the opinion that these inju-ries will not prove fatal. The acci-dent occurred as Chavez was en-deavoring to make a landing here. The Alps had been crossed successfully and the avialor was descending with the power of his machine cut off. When about 30 feet above the ground a sudden gust of wind seemed to catch the monoplane, which turned over and fell. When the crowds that had been watching the descent ran up they found Cha-vez lying bleeding and unconscious beneath the twisted wreckage. Willing hands lifted the aviator from the ground and bore him to the heavited. the hospital.
