

\$12,000 Fire Levels Koduco

8,982 Receive No. 4 Ration **Books in County**

A total of 8,982 No. 4 ration books have been issued in Gates county, according to a report made this week by Mrs. L. C. Hand, price clerk.

She said it was thought that e were still some people in county who have not yet recived their books. People in the county who have not received their books should apply at the rationing board office.

The total number of books issued is considerably less than the 1940 census of 10,060 for Gates county. Either a large number of people have not yet received their books, or a large number have left the county for employment in defense areas.
