Following is an excerpt from a letter written by an 18-yearold Gatesville boy to his parents:

Dear Mother and Dad:

"I don't know anything to write about, but I have been thinking of you all day long, and just have to drop you a line tonight. Sundays don't seem the same any more, going to school and you don't have anything to even remind you that it is Sunday.

I was thinking today of the Sundays I use to spend at home. I would get up around nine o'clock and go to church; after church I would sit around and read the paper and listen to the radio, waiting for you to fix dinner, mother. After a good meal, I would always find somewhere to go, come home around supper time, and get some of that good old ham. You know I always enjoyed those meals we use to eat, all sitting around in the kitchen. After supper I would be gone till you all went to bed. I didn't spend much time at home, and for that I am sorry. You know you never find out some things till it is too late.

I sure would like to be there with you tonight. I bet you are sitting around that old stove listening to the radio. I will be glad when those days can come back, but now we all have a job to do before we can live that life again. We have to make a good job out of it, so we can go on living the life we want to live without being disturbed by some dirty Jap. The way I feel about it is-I would like to be with you, but I would rather be here doing my part for you."
