arily did, Artz said. "She did not seem to be sick for she ate her dairy feed all right. The milk supply let up a little, too. Mrs. Webb thought perhaps a little extra loose salt, besides the salt

petite. The loose salt was provided in ample quantity and sure enough the cow's appetite picked up and she started grazing again," the agent continued. "All livestock producers and family cow owners may learn something from this," he added. 'It pays to supply an adequate amount of loose salt in addition to the salt brick in order to meet the requirements of the animals.

The agent said: "Salt requirements differ for each class of animals. They differ even with animals in the same class. Furthermore, they differ with the season of the year and with the kind of feed. Only by feeding salt free choice can we be sure that livestock are getting all the salt they want when they want it."
