Bulk of 1945 Peanut Crop Is Harvested

Gatesville.-Peanut picking is still going on in this county, but the majority of the crop has already been harvested. Farmers have averaged making only 60 percent of a normal crop.

Showers in the Virginia-Carolina area have delayed harvesting slightly. However farmers' stocks are moving to the mills rapidly. Quality is generally fair but size is running smaller than usual for this area.

Harvesting is estimated to be about 95 percent completed in the Texas-Oklahoma area with most of the crop already marketed. Quality of the crop in North Texas and Oklahoma is better than the crop of last season. Both meat content and size are good.

Demand for shelled and cleaned peanuts in all sections continues far in excess of the aavilable supply. In the Southwest some Runners are still being booked for future shipment but most shellers have withdrawn on Spanish futures. Most shellers have withdrawn on late spring orders.

Farmers' stock peanuts in the various sections are generally moving at scheduled prices based on percentage of sound mature kernels. Shelled and cleaned goods continue to sell at ceiling.



Area Board Of **Appeals Closes**

Windsor.-The last meeting of Appeals Board No. 1, which included 26 eastern North Caro-Tuesday: Philadelphia Youth lina counties from Nash to the Atlantic Ocean, was held Friday afternoon, November 30 in Windsor, reported C. Working with the Selective Service Board, the Appeals Board handled any complications arising in the drafting of men for Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. the armed services. If further


cases were then sent to the President. Mr. Spruill stated that production of electric toys. in their five years of service the local appeals board had handled more than a thousand cases.


