"Opportunities for Rural Incustries" by experts in their fields, was presided over by Felix A. Grisette, managing director of the State Planning Board.

Grisette told of the planning board's recent study on resources in the State and its recommendations for action. He proposed that a central agency be formed for the coordination of efforts of all State groups along the lines of industrialization.

Dr. C. F. Korstian, dean of the Duke University School for Forestry and president of the North Carolina Forestry Association, spoke briefly on the oportunities for forest industries, suggesting that cooperative production and marketing be promoted.

George S. Coble, Lexington dairyman and president of the State College Dairy Foundation, urged that the State endeavor to train young men, not only for the dairy industry, but for all industries. State College, he said, has failed in its duty to help supply the need for trained labor. He offered suggestions for the increased production of dairy products, pointing out that North Carolina for years has been importing millions of dollars worth of such products.

Crop Processing

Crop processing opportunities were outlined by D. S. Coltrane, assistant, commissioner of agriculture, who listed several in-stances where small industrial plants could be utilized profitably by certain communities.

Dr. D. E. Brady, professor of animal husbandry at State College, spoke on food processing. D. S. Matheson, marketing specialist of the State Department of Agriculture, spoke on marketing services. State Senator Carroll Rogers of Tryon spoke on the State's potential mineral wealth. D. S. Weaver of State College declared that there is great need for farm and home repairs and suggested an increased training program for young people in rural areas.

Several people offered concrete Goldsboro Chamber of Commerce, suggested that individual leaders be appointed to help develop the idea in communities throughout the State, and that information on potential industries be brought to the attention of the people.


