Gates County's allotment is 360 cc's or enough to take care of 180 persons, including preg-nant women and children.

The priority age group has been broadened to include the five to nine years age group, the birth through four years age group, and pregnant women. Vaccine now available, however, will first be used for pregnant women and to complete the five through nine year age group, as it is not known when sufficient vaccine will be available for the second prioritybirth through 4 years of age.

Parental request blanks for the five to nine year group will be distributed to the schools in the near future, for the children to take home so that a parent may sign and send back to school if desires the vaccination for a child.

There are no charges for the vaccine according to Mrs. Roy Hayes, public health nurse.




