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**Eastern Press Will Finance A New Building at Chowan Printing School**

Williamston.—The Roy Parker School of Printing at Chowan College gave a good report of its stewardship at the Eastern North Carolina Press Association meeting in Williamston during the weekend.

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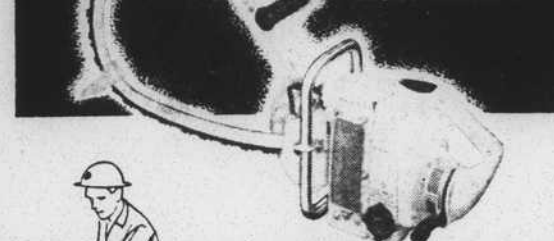
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**N. C. Symphony Drive Under Way For Memberships**

**Parson to Person**

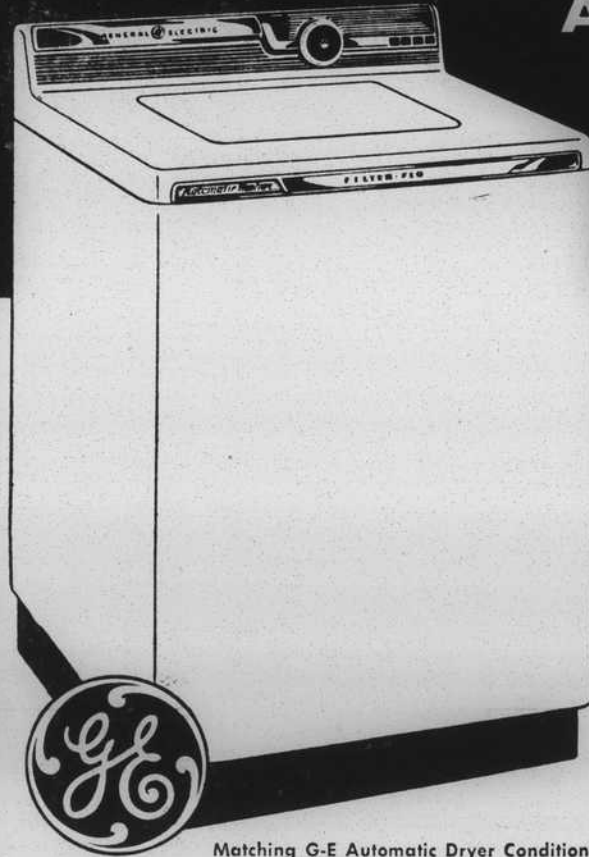
Two stories, true stories from real life, illustrate the contrast in the way men live.

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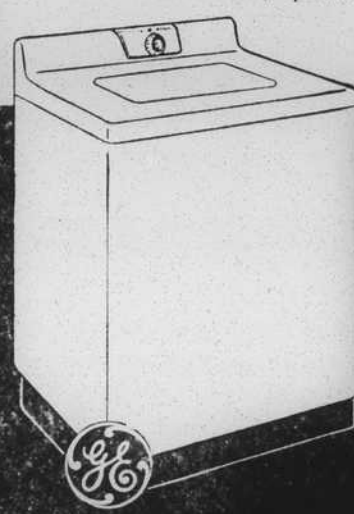

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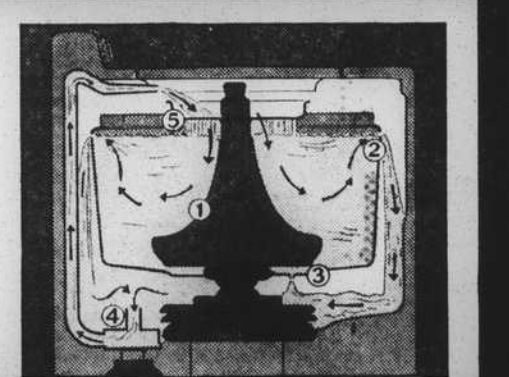
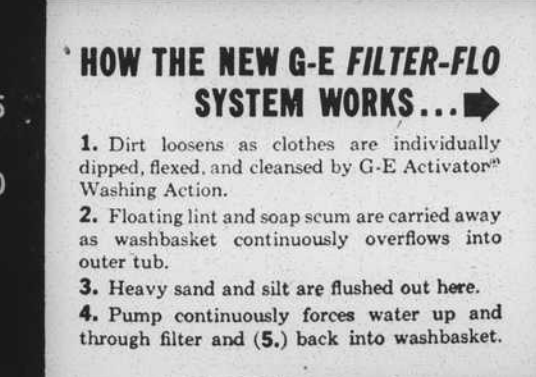
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
