





A curious sight is to see wealthy Chinamen traveling on board of a coast or ocean steamer. They all retire to their cabins to remain there during the voyage. Here they will cat, drink, amuse themselves and smoke ephum, with the pungent odor of which the neighboring cabins are soon umpleasantly filled. On a voyage from Niugpo to Shanghai I once visit ed a Chinese steerage; there were ever seven hundred men and women crouched on the floor, smoking their peculiar water and opium pipes, the tmoke of which filled the whole ship. It is always a great enriosity for a stranger to enter one of the public places, mostly Chinese teahouses, where a kind of sofa arrangement for From the various buildings in the opium smokers may be found. Places exist with more than a hundred of such sofus, on each of which two Chinamen generally lie, the one conversing, while the other holds his pipe over a small burning lamp and pulls the smekable extracts of the Indian poppy. #### THE POISONER ARRESTED.

#### Apprehension of Negro Woman Who Killed Dr. Love.

Charlotte, Special - A telephone me sage to the Observer Tue-day morning from Dr. A. J. Austin, of Oak Grove. Union county, stated that Mr. Vann Sikes, of Stanly county, and the wife of Sam Nots, colored, have been arrested on a charge of poisoning Dr. S. J. Love, on the 31st of last August. A telegram to the Observer in the afternoon from Monroe states: "A telephone message received here a short time ago says that Mr. Vanu Sikes, a thour to carer a period of industrial prominent white man, and a negro woman, have been arrested, charged with poisoning Dr. S. J. Love and others at Mr. Tom Love's a few yeek; ago. The woman has confessed that Sikes pave her \$5 and the per on for doing the deed. The prisoners are guarded near the scene. Since the poisoning the legil authors ities have been difficultly at work on the case with the result that the Not: woman was arrested Tuesday morning. Dr. Austin Thoned the Observer that she had made a confession of her guilt to the officer making the arrest, and had implicated her hu band's brother, John Nots, a negro named Hamilton, and finally Mr. Vann Sikes.

The woman was a cook at According to Dr. Austin's information she said that John Nots had given the poison to her and told her to person Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Love, Dr. J. S. Love, his brother Wade Love, and a thresher a med Taylor. The porcon was in the form of a white powder, and was, presumably, arsenic. In giving the powder to her, she said John Nots explained that he had received it from a negro named Hamilton, and that It had been given to the latter ly Mr. Vann Sikes, who would pay \$5 if it were administered.

The prisoner said that she sprinkled the poison over tomatoes, which she served at dinner and which were eaten by others in addition to these she intended to kill. After the white people had concluded their meal she removed and threw away all uneaten tomatoes to prevent the poisoning the negroes in the kitchen. From the information supplied Dr. Austin no malice on the part of the woman thus far appears She committed the murder for the \$5

I pon the evidence of the prisoner Mr. Sikes was arrested, and the place of trial was moved, in the evening to Lo ust Level, in Stanly county This place is about eight miles from a tilephone line; but through the courtesy of Dr. Austin The Observer sent a messenger to Locust Level Tuesday night. He returned to Oak Grove at 10 o'clock and reported that the trial was in progress when he left Locust Level Mr. Frank Armfield, of Monroe, is representing Mr. Vann Sikes, while another lawyer from Monroe is appearing for the presecution.

Dr. Austin stated that exitement over the arrests is intense. It is not generally believed, he said, that Mr. Vann Sikes had any connection with the poisoning and his impli a for in the matter is due to a conspiracy on the part of the negroes, who distike him for reasons political and other-
