

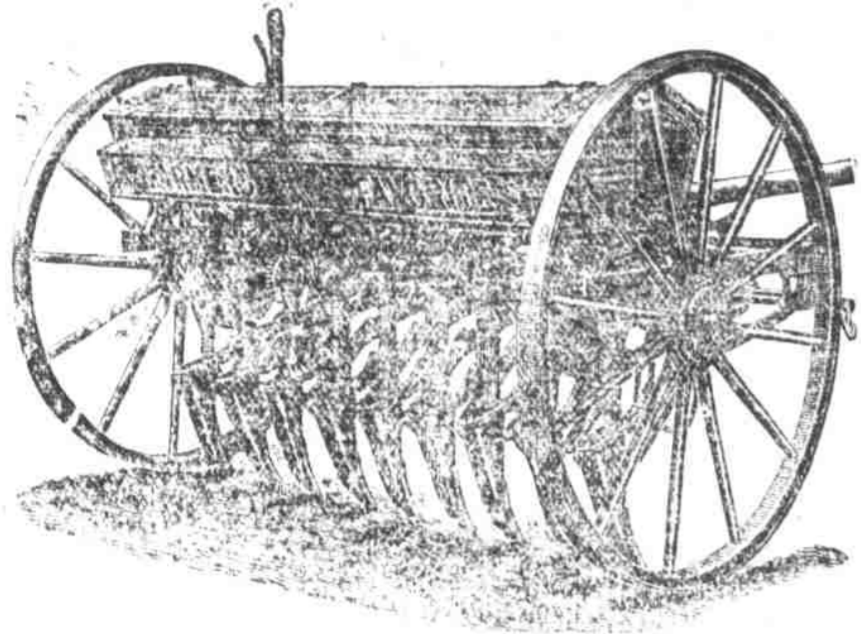

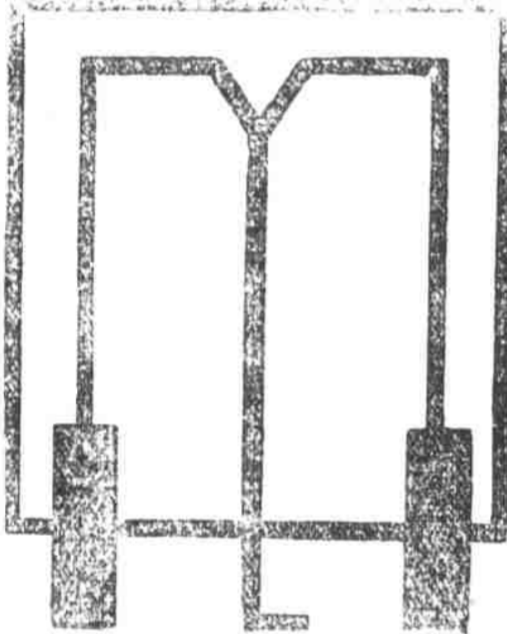

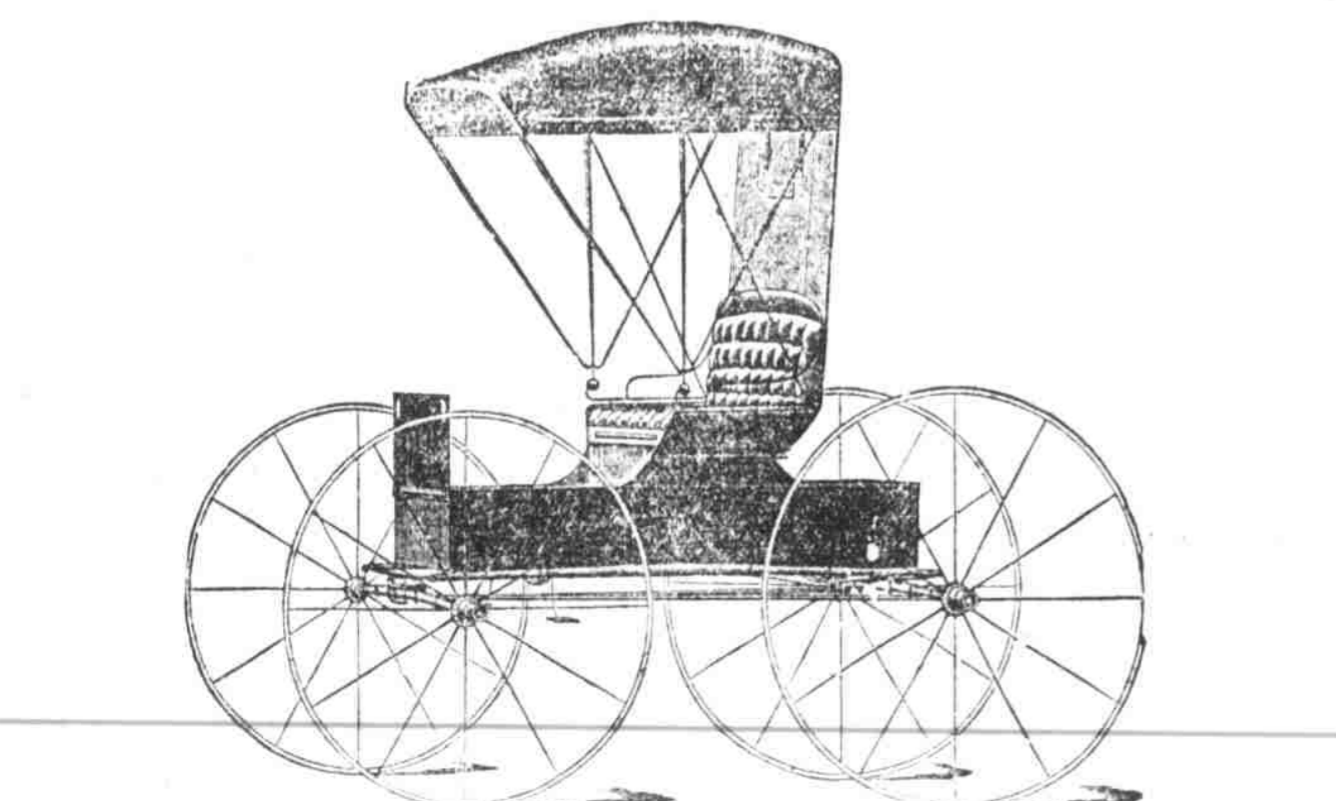

### Traveling and Opium Smoking.

A curious sight is to see wealthy Chinamen traveling on board of a coast or ocean steamer. They all retire to their cabins to remain there during the voyage. Here they will eat, drink, amuse themselves and smoke opium, with the pungent odor of which the neighboring cabins are soon unpleasantly filled. On a voyage from Ningpo to Shanghai I once visited a Chinese steamer; there were over seven hundred men and women crunched on the floor, smoking their peculiar water and opium pipes, the smoke of which filled the whole ship. It is always a great curiosity for a stranger to enter one of the public places, mostly Chinese tea houses, where a kind of sofa arrangement for opium smokers may be found. Places exist with more than a hundred of such sofas, on each of which two Chinamen generally lie, the one conversing, while the other holds his pipe over a small burning lamp and puffs the smokable extracts of the Indian poppy. Of course, the fumes render it impossible for a foreigner to remain in such a place for any length of time. Emil S. Fischer, in Collier's Weekly.

### Aid for Galveston.

Galveston, Texas, Special.—John Sealy, chairman of the finance committee, a sub-committee of the Galveston central relief committee, and custodian of the Galveston relief fund, has given the following to the Associated Press: All subscriptions that have been turned over to me up to and including October 1, 1900, from all sources, amount to \$781,043. This amount includes all money received by me direct, all received by Mayor W. C. Jones and also \$269,500 remitted to me by Governor Sayers out of his receipts made to him.

### The Cut in Sugar.

New York, Special.—The American Sugar Refining Company has reduced its prices for refined sugar to 5.75 and withdrew all guarantees. The independent refiners also cut the price to 5.75. This leaves the price of the American company 5 points below that of other companies.

### The Flag Torn Down.

San Antonio, Tex., Special.—United States Consul W. W. Mills, at Chihuahua, Mexico, has sent a note to the Federal authorities, and also to the State Department of Washington, detailing an insult to the American flag over his consulate, on September 16th the anniversary of Mexican independence, by a mob of Mexicans. He had hoisted the United States and Mexican flags in honor of the day and the mob tore down the United States colors.

### Serious Accusation.

Manassas, Va., Special.—Prof. J. C. Bealin, principal of the Prince William Normal school at Brentsville, in this county, has been arrested by Deputy Sheriff Rorabaugh and placed in jail at this place upon a warrant charging him with having committed a felonious assault upon a young girl 15 years of age, who was a pupil of his school. He was taken before Justice for a preliminary hearing but waived an examination and was committed to jail to await the action of the grand jury.

## MEETING OF CLUBS

Gathering of Democratic Hosts in Indianapolis.

A SPEECH BY MR. STEVENSON

The City a Scene of Democratic Festivity—Meeting Called to Order by Chairman Jones.

Indianapolis, Ind., Special.—The city of Indianapolis Wednesday night presented a scene of Democratic festivity. From the various buildings in the business portion American flags and streamers of hunting were hung to the evening breeze while prominent among the decorations portraits framed in electric bulbs, of distinguished leaders of the Democracy were displayed. At 8 o'clock a parade of all the Democratic clubs and delegates marched through the streets, while thousands of people lined the sidewalks. The programme for the opening session of the convention, as officially announced, was changed just prior to the hour of meeting. President W. R. Hearst was expected to be present to preside, but telegraphed that he was ill and unable to attend. The convention was therefore called to order by Senator James R. Jones, chairman of the Democratic national committee. Mayor Tammart was introduced and made an address of welcome, which was briefly responded to by J. R. Rice, of Canton, O. Senator Jones, in opening the convention, said:

"In the absence of President Hearst, who has been unavoidably detained from the meeting, I have been requested to call this convention to order and to do so now. During the last two or three weeks, clubs have been organized and have been reported to headquarters at the rate of over 500 a day, until there are now by actual count 732 Democratic clubs with an average membership of more than 200 already organized in all the States of this Union. With an organization of this kind, consisting of more than 2,000,000 members, thoroughly organized and thoroughly awake to the necessities of the situation, at work in their localities everywhere, there can be no reasonable doubt of the result on the 10th of November.

An organization was then effected by electing Mr. Tammart temporary chairman, J. H. Morgan, of New York, secretary, W. Jefferson Pollard, of St. Louis, reading clerk, and Myron D. King, of Indianapolis, sergeant-at-arms.

At this juncture Adlai E. Stevenson was escorted into the hall by the band and his appearance sent the convention into a pandemonium of applause, he said:

"My fellow Democrats: I thank you for this cordial greeting. I will not undertake now to address you, but at a later time, in accordance with the address some remarks to my fellow programme, I will have the pleasure to denounce the United States. I can only say to you now that I bring out words of good cheer from the great Democratic State of Illinois."

The next speaker was Mayor Samuel M. Jones, of Toledo. Mr. Jones spoke in part as follows: "No matter what may be said to the contrary, I think that the only real question that is now before the American people in this campaign is the question of the right of self-government. The only difference between a republic and an empire is this: In a republic of sovereign equals all of the people participate in the government on equal terms; in an empire subject and dependent colonies are ruled by the home government without their consent or participation. Which principle shall we adopt? I believe that we will be true to the Democracy of the Golden Rule rather than to the autocracy of the rule of gold, and I believe that the American people will reaffirm the doctrine of the right of self-government as set down in the Declaration of Independence."

### Negroes Take Charge.

Columbia, S. C., Special.—Wednesday night, for the first time since they were allowed to vote, the negroes took entire control of the Republican organization in the State. E. H. Deas, a negro, displaced R. R. Tolbert, white, is chairman of the State executive committee, and General Robert Smalls, a negro, was re-elected vice-chairman over J. H. Wheeler, a white man.

### Trustees of Peabody Fund.

New York, Special.—The annual meeting of the trustees of the Peabody educational fund was held here Wednesday. Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Melville W. Fuller was elected first vice president. Those present of the board of trustees were Rt. Rev. Henry B. Whipple, of Minnesota; Henry A. Green, of Massachusetts; James D. Porter, of Tennessee; J. Pierpont Morgan, of New York; W. A. Courtenay, of South Carolina; Henderson M. Somerville, of Alabama; Chas. Semner of Louisiana; Geo. F. Hoar, of Massachusetts; J. L. M. Curry, of Washington.

According to report Congress will be asked to give the Navy Department authority to contract for at least 12 small gunboats for Philippine service.

It is said that General Wood having declared the wreck of the Maine an obstacle to navigation it will be removed and perhaps the mystery of its destruction will be satisfactorily solved.

President Mitchell, of the Anthracite Coal Miners' Union, says 112,000 men have struck in Northern Pennsylvania.

The Duke of York will visit Australia and open the first Parliament of the federated colonies.

### Miscellaneous.

It is now considered unlikely that the United States troops will be withdrawn from China.

Secretary of War Root telegraphed that he is steadily regaining his health.

Several republicans of European and American governments are at work in the Census Office studying the methods pursued by the United States.

The United States Government has demanded of the Government of Morocco an indemnity of \$5,000 for the benefit of the heirs of Marcus Aurelius, who was murdered at Fez.

Major J. B. Mott, the United States Army officer who witnessed the recent French maneuvers, says that France has the best cannon in the world.

According to information conveyed in a cablegram to the State Department Great Britain and Europe are about to enter a period of industrial depression.

### Trouble in Peru.

Lima, Peru, By Cable.—Owing to a lack of confidence on the part of the police authorities of Lima, a riotous conflict took place in the principal square of the city between the police and a force of mounted patriots. So great was the excitement that the cathedral bell rang an alarm. Some of the leading members of Lima were President Romon to follow the example of M. Caspary Ponce, former President of France and former Minister to Peru, who is a prisoner in Fort Santa Catalina.

### Prominent Suicide.

Birmingham, Ala., Special.—Wayne N. Newbold, superintendent of the South and North and Birmingham mineral divisions of the Louisville and Nashville railroad, committed suicide at his residence in the city by shooting himself in the mouth with a 28-caliber pistol. Mr. Newbold lost his wife some weeks ago. He was prominently mentioned as a probable successor to General Manager Metcalf of the Louisville and Nashville system, who recently resigned to go with another road, was interested in many enterprises and wealthy.

### Porto Ricans Join Democrats.

San Juan de Puerto Rico, By Cable.—The Federal party at its convention at Saginas, passed resolutions affiliating itself with the Democratic party in the United States. A cablegram from Wm. J. Bryan and Jas. K. Jones, chairman of the national Democratic committee, urging harmony, was read.

### The Georgia Election.

Atlanta, Ga., Special.—Reports received from all parts of the State indicate that the Democratic majority in Wednesday's general election for members of Congress, State House officers, members of the general assembly and local county officers, will be about 55,000. No opposition developed against the Democratic nominees, and except in a few counties where the Populist organization is strongest, little interest was taken in the election. In counties where the Democratic strength was undoubted the vote was light.

### THE POISONER ARRESTED.

Apprehension of Negro Woman Who Killed Dr. Love.

Charlotte, Special.—A telephone message to the Observer Tuesday morning from Dr. A. J. Austin, of Oak Grove, Union county, stated that Mr. Vann Sikes, of Stanly county, and the wife of Sam Nots, colored, have been arrested on a charge of poisoning Dr. S. J. Love, on the 31st of last August. A telegram to the Observer in the afternoon from Monroe states: "A telephone message received here a short time ago says that Mr. Vann Sikes, a prominent white man, and a negro woman, have been arrested, charged with poisoning Dr. S. J. Love and others at Mr. Tom Love's a few weeks ago. The woman has confessed that Sikes gave her \$5 and the poison for doing the deed. The prisoners are guarded near the scene. About fifty people are collected and the highest excitement prevails."

Since the poisoning the legal authorities have been diligently at work on the case with the result that the Not's woman was arrested Tuesday morning. Dr. Austin phoned the Observer that she had made a confession of her guilt to the officer making the arrest, and had implicated her husband's brother, John Nots, a negro named Hamilton, and finally Mr. Vann Sikes.

The woman was a cook at the Love residence at the time of the poisoning. According to Dr. Austin's information she said that John Nots had given the poison to her and told her to poison Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Love, Dr. J. S. Love, his brother Wade Love, and a thrasher named Taylor. The poison was in the form of a white powder, and was, presumably, arsenic. In giving the powder to her, she said John Nots explained that he had received it from a negro named Hamilton, and that it had been given to the latter by Mr. Vann Sikes, who would pay \$5 if it were administered.

The prisoner said that she sprinkled the poison over tomatoes, which she served at dinner and which were eaten by others in addition to those she intended to kill. After the white people had concluded their meal she removed and threw away all uneaten tomatoes to prevent the poisoning the negroes in the kitchen. From the information supplied Dr. Austin no malice on the part of the woman thus far appears. She committed the murder for the \$5.

From the evidence of the prisoner Mr. Sikes was arrested, and the place of trial was moved, in the evening to Laurens level, in Stanly county. This place is about eight miles from a telephone line, but through the courtesy of Dr. Austin the Observer sent a messenger to Laurens level, Tuesday night. He returned to Oak Grove at 10 o'clock and reported that the trial was in progress when he left Laurens level. Mr. Frank Armfield, of Monroe, is representing Mr. Vann Sikes, while another lawyer from Monroe is appearing for the prosecution.

Dr. Austin stated that excitement over the arrests is intense. It is not generally believed, he said, that Mr. Vann Sikes had any connection with the poisoning and his inclusion in the matter is due to a conspiracy on the part of the negroes, who dislike him for reasons political and otherwise.
