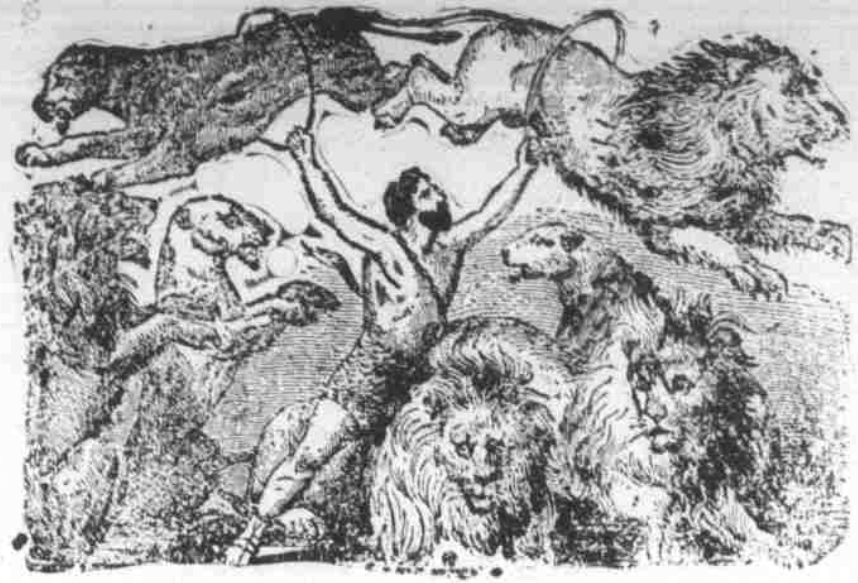

**LAND SALE.**

Under an order of the Superior Court for partition among the parties in interest, the undersigned will, at the court house door in Wentworth, at noon, on Monday, the 19th DAY OF MAY, 1913,

sell for cash to the highest bidder the tract of land owned and occupied by the late W. M. Saffle at the time of his death, situate in Wentworth Township on the waters of Town Creek, adjoining the lands of Nathan Mobley and others, containing 372 acres, more or less.
