**A PROFITABLE ENTERPRISE.** Messrs. Scott, McColough & Charney, of Charlotte, certified public accountants, have just finished an audit of the books of the city of Reidsville, and their analysis of the operations of the different departments of the city government is of special interest to our people in view of the pending negotiations with the Southern Public Utilities Company with reference to selling out the Reidsville electric light plant to that corporation.

Without giving the figures in detail at present (which will later be published in full) the statement shows that the total operating revenues of the light department for the year ending May 31, 1916, was \$24,745.00. The total operating expenses of the same were \$12,750.33. The net operating revenue was \$11,994.67. Less interest on bonds, \$1,250.00; or a net profit of the electric light department of \$10,744.67. The electric power produced for the year was 526,950 k.w.h. Cost, exclusive of interest on bonds, .0242 per k.w.h.

The operations of the water department did not make such a favorable financial showing. The total operating expenses were \$14,564.55, with a gross operating revenue of \$10,717.06, or a net loss in operation of \$3,847.49. Including interest on bonds, \$2,500.00, the total loss in operation of the water department was \$6,347.49.

It is thus shown that the electric light department made a net profit of \$10,744.67 after paying interest on bonds and depreciation of plant. This is at the rate of 5 per cent. on \$2,314,705.40.

To combine the two departments—deducting the loss of the water department, including interest on bonds—leaves a net profit on the combined plants of \$4,397.78, or 5 per cent on an investment of \$87,955.60.

The statement shows that the cost of producing electric power was very economical for a steam plant. As a matter of fact there is a saving of about \$3,000.00 in the cost of coal alone over the preceding twelve months. This was largely brought about by having the engines and boilers overhauled and other improvements made.

These figures show conclusively that the city of Reidsville would be making a very poor bargain to sell out its electric light plant for \$30,000 to a foreign corporation. The net earnings on the electric light plant are over 35 per cent per annum on \$30,000.

In this connection The Review would call attention to the fact that while the cost of producing power in the home plant is not quite 2 1/2c. per k.w.h. it is probable that this cost in the current could be reduced 40 or 50 per cent. by connecting with the Southern Power Company. It would seem a wise course to hold on to our electric light plant as a good thing and take steps to reduce the cost of operations and a corresponding increase in profits by securing hydro electric current from the Southern Power Company or some other similar company.
