Cobb—will see that there is water enough at all times, and with this addition to our means of fighting the fire fiend, we will sleep easier at night.

Early arrangements will be made for practice work on the part of the junior brigade, meantime a cordial invitation is given to other young men in town to join those already enlisted in this splendid preparedness against the worst foe our town has, and build up an unit that will be a byword for efficiency, and tower of strength in moments of stress.

**Planting Day**

The proclamation of Governor Bickett calling upon the people of North Carolina to plant some kind of food crop on April 5, should be heeded by everyone who can rent or borrow vacant places this year. That is the only way the high cost of living can be materially reduced. If the price of food is to come down more food will have to be produced. There has been a great deal of talk about high prices resulting from clever manipulations by food speculators. That, of course, has had something to do with the prices, but the reason back of it all—the reason the speculators were able to manipulate the markets—was a natural shortage of food crops.

The governor has called public attention to this need, in proclaiming April 5 as Planting Day. He is making an effort to secure the co-operation of everyone in getting crops planted this year. More food crops is the slogan which will lead the North Carolina farmer out of the muck and mire or dependency; food for man and stock grown on the farm is the policy which will rid the State of the tenant class of farmers.
