



According to figures furnished by the State Board of Health, 20 per cent of the white births and 80 per cent of the colored births in the State are attended by midwives. lt is the opinion of the Board that the high mortality of colored babies. which is almost twice that for white babies, is largely due to the ignorant midwives. The Board therefore endorses the ordinance of Rocky Mount and recommends such legislation to other city and county health departments
