### HIGHER CIGARETTE TAX WILL HIT THE FARMER

W. N. Reynolds of the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company made the following statement with reference to the proposed tax on cigarettes as recommended by the House ways and means committee:

"The increase of 100 per cent in the tax on cigarettes as proposed by the House ways and means committee will be a discrimination against the farmers in the Carolinas and Virginia, who are the largest growers of cigarette tobacco. Cigars are competitors of cigarettes and cigarettes are already carrying a heavy tax as compared with cigars. The tax at the present time on cigarettes is \$1.25 per 1,000, and reduced to pounds it amounts to more than 50 cents per pound. The proposed increase of cigarettes of 100 per cent, makes \$2.50 per 1,000, or over \$1.00 per pound. The present tax on cigars will not average more than 20 cents per pound, which is a discrimination against the farmers who grow cigarette tobacco in favor of the farmers who grow cigar tobacco. We can see no reason why cigars and cigarettes should not bear about the same tax as the best authorities of the country now claim that cigarettes is the most wholesome way tobacco can be used.

"The tax must be added to the cost of the manufactured article. As that cost increases the cost to the consumer also increases, the amount consumed decreases. This means that the sale of leaf tobacco in the States that grow cigarette tobacco will not increase in quantity or price like they would if they were put on a fair taxable basis with cigars. Since the growers of tobacco suitable for cigarettes are so financially affected it would be to their interests to immediately communicate with their representatives and senators at Washington, urging that their interest be fully considered in making any change in the tax on cigarettes.

"The proposed increased tax on cigarettes would unquestionably mean that the grower of cigarette tobacco would not get justice on account of the consumption of cigarettes being reduced by their increased cost, and the government instead of increasing its income by this method, would more than likely find that the decreased consumption would more than offset the amount derived from the additional tax."

### FARMERS' UNION FAVORS CONSCRIPTION OF INCOMES

Whereas, the United States in the present great war needs both money and men, and we rejoice in the general demand for a pay-as-you-go policy instead of wholesale issues of interesting-bearing bonds. As has been well said: "By financing a war through borrowing money we put a double burden on the patriotic man who does the fighting. We not only take him away from his business and risk his life, but we saddle the payment of taxes on him to pay the interest of the war debt if he is so fortunate as to survive. Certainly if every citizen is under obligation to serve his country in time of war, the obligation must rest on income as well as life." And

Whereas, the American Commission on War Finance, 60 Broadway, New York City, is a patriotic organization composed of such eminent Americans as George Foster Peabody, Amos Pinchot, Frederick C. Howe, and others, standing for the following principles:

"The war must be paid for as it proceeds, in dollars as well as in lives. There must be no crushing legacy of bonded debt to be paid in taxes by the men who have done the fighting and their children. Let us make this a cash war, pay-as-you-enter war. The burden of fighting must be carried by those who are physically strong and fit to fight. The burden of finance must be borne by those who are financially strong and are able to give."

Resolved, that the State Council of the North Carolina Farmers' Union, in accordance with the taxation policies enunciated by the State Farmers' Union hereby petition the Senators and Representatives from North Carolina in the support of the policy advocated by the American Commission on War Finance as follows:

"That there shall be levied on all net incomes in excess of \$2,000 (for unmarried persons) and in excess of \$3,000 (for married persons) an annual war tax, beginning at 2 per cent and increasing on a sliding scale to a point which will permit of no individual retaining an annual net income in excess of \$100,000 such a tax to continue until all bonds, treasury notes and other obligations issue for war purposes are paid."

Resolved 2nd, that copies of this resolution be sent to all our State Senators and Representatives from North Carolina and also to North Carolina newspapers with request that they petition Congress on the same subject.

### CORN ACREAGE IN CASWELL HAS BEEN INCREASED

A census of the crops planted by the tobacco growing county of Caswell shows that the acreage of corn has been increased about 33 1/3 per cent, with about 75 per cent of the crop already planted. Practically all farmers in the county have planted gardens this year, while but approximately 15 per cent have been in the habit of doing this in previous years, according to a report from County Agricultural Agent J. C. Hunter, who represents the Agricultural Extension Service in that county with headquarters in Yanceyville.

Mr. Hunter states that most of the gardens are coming along in good shape and the most of his farmer acquaintances are preparing to sow cowpeas or soybeans. Many have planted Irish potatoes—very few having ever grown any before—and all will set out sweet potatoes. The acreage of fall sown-wheat was increased about 30 per cent and present indications are that it is about 50 per cent of an average or maximum crop.
