HON. PERCY ALDEN, M. P.

Distinguished Member of British Parliament to Lecture at Chautauqua-la a Descendant of John and Priscilla Alden of Massachusetts Colony.

Perhaps the most distinguished visftor to come to this city during the Chautauqua week this year will be the Hon. Percy Alden, M. P., of London, who will deliver a lecture on the subject "The Future of Europe." Last fall Director Paul M. Pearson of the Chautauqua Association went abroad especially to arrange for this lecture. Special permission had to be obtained from the British government for the Hon. Percy Alden to leave the country on such a mission, and this had to be reaffirmed early in the spring at about the time America entered the war.

Mr. Alden is one of the deeper thinkers of the British Parliament members and has been devoting much of his attention toward preparation for the period of reconstruction.
