The venerable T. R. Williams is quite ill at the home of his son, Mr. Walker Williams in the North End. He is over 92 years old and is hardly expected to survive, we regret to learn.

Tobacco baskets are in great demand in Winston-Salem, judging by prices that are being paid by several firms. According to reports current several loads were sold here at from 80 to 85 cents per basket. This is about double the prevailing prices heretofore—Winston Sentinel.

While men drafted for army service are being passed on by local boards in the order in which they were drawn in Washington July 20, it seems that order will not be strictly observed in sending them to camp. They go in increments of 30 per cent. September 5, 30 per cent. September 15, 30 per cent. September 30, the remaining 10 per cent. later. Local boards are authorized to consider farming conditions, so that men engaged in farm work may be passed over and sent with the second or third increment instead of the first. It will be noticed, too, that all men sent to camp will again be physically examined after arriving there and some of them may be rejected on the final examination. Tobacco sales have been light since the opening of the local market, due to the farmers being so busy saving the fast ripening tobacco that they do not have time to market much. Prices on primings are very good indeed, the average so far being around 15c. This is an unusual average for first offerings of sand leaves.

The United States civil service commission has announced an examination to be held at Reidsville on Sept. 22d as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Wentworth N. C., and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interest of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at that office was \$452 for the last fiscal year.

Mr. John William Carroll, a well known farmer of the Mizpah section, died at his home Friday afternoon, aged 69 years. His death was caused by heart failure. Mr. Carroll was an industrious, useful citizen and enjoyed the respect and confidence of all who knew him. He leaves a widow, four sons and one daughter. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Carl Craig at Mizpah church Saturday afternoon and interment was at Mizpah cemetery.

The Reidsville soldiers are liable to be called away any day now. All other towns are arranging to give their soldier boys farewell dinners and Reidsville must not be the only town omitting a fitting farewell to its soldier boys. Judge Ira R. Humphreys has consented to act as chairman of a committee to be appointed to raise funds for such a farewell dinner and it is to be hoped our people will heartily cooperate in the undertaking. There is no time to lose, however, and a committee should be appointed at once to push the work. Judge Humphreys will appreciate any suggestions from citizens along this line. What is to be done should be done quickly.

The local exemption board has not completed the work of passing upon claims of registrants for exemptions in the first draft yet, hence the number that will be certified from this county to the district board for military service cannot now be accurately stated. It is known that the board turned down the claims of quite a lot of those who asked for exemptions on the grounds of dependent relatives. Mr. A. D. Ivie, one of the members of the board had to attend Yanceyville court the first of the week and his absence will delay final certification of the first draft. It is generally believed it will be necessary to make a second call to complete the county's quota. A number of registrants who did not put in exemption claims before the county board have filed claims on occupational grounds before the district board, we understand.
