It would be well for our people to remember that they are urged to send their Christmas packages early, to avoid the rush, and especially it is urged that presents to soldiers be sent as early as possible, the government says by the 15th of November. Be sure you wrap securely, address plainly, affix sufficient postage, and parcels may be addressed, "Not to be opened until Christmas," or similar inscriptions. Address the soldiers as "Private John Smith, Company So-and-So, Camp Sevier, S. C." or whatever camp they may be in. This is just a form for you to go by. By observing these brief rules you will greatly facilitate the

work of the postal clerks, and get your packages through safely, and quickly.
