They left immediately for a bridal trip to Washington and other places of interest. The bride, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. T. Wootton, is a young woman of many rare traits. The groom is the popular bookkeeper at the Bank of Reidsville.

Joe Martin was found with the car, in which 16 gallons of whiskey were being transported, according to charges preferred against Martin, who will be given a hearing at the June term of Federal court in this city. Subsequently Pettigrew claimed the machine and Judge James E. Boyd yesterday permitted him to recover it after the former filed \$550 bond, the car having been appraised at this figure. The machine was libeled by District Attorney W. C. Hammer, of Ashboro, acting for the Federal government. Final

disposition of the automobile will be made at the Federal court in June, it is expected.—Greensboro News.

Rev. John A. Wray, who is to conduct the meeting at the First Baptist church beginning next Monday night, is a cousin of Tom, A. C. and Frank Dixon. The Atlanta Journal says of him: "Rev. John A. Wray is perhaps the most brilliant pulpit orator of his age in this country. He is a cousin of the Dixons and gives evidence of the relationship in his eloquent and characteristic speaking."

The local Chautauqua committee has received the dates for Reidsville's Chautauqua for the coming season. These dates are June 15-21, inclusive. The patrons of Chautauqua will doubtless be pleased with the information that this season's program has among other new features the Royal Belgian Veterans' Band. This is the biggest musical attraction that has ever been over this Chautauqua circuit. At Tuesday morning's session of Judge Humphreys' recorder's court the following cases were tried: Will Garland, colored, was convicted of the charge of assault on Henry Bushnell, colored. Gus Ellis was tried on two charges. The first was on a warrant sworn out by V. W. Cook charging Ellis with obtaining money under false pretense. It was alleged that Ellis was given \$10 to secure a quart of whiskey. He failed to procure the

liquor and kept the money. On this charge Ellis was bound over in the sum of \$200 for trial at the next term of Rockingham county Superior court. The other charge against Ellis was for retailing whiskey. He was found guilty and sentenced to work on the county roads for 60 days. Jake Pickard, colored, was convicted of exceeding the speed limit and the usual fine and costs imposed on him.

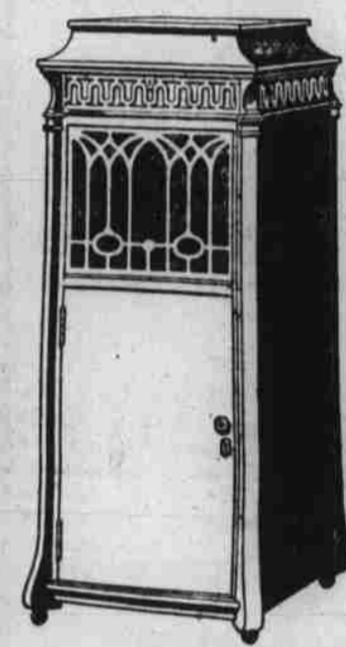
