The Durham County Fair. Great bursts of music greeted my ears as I alighted from the car at 3, 1914. The music came from two merry-go-rounds and a band, which was playing the popular airs. After taking a view of the fair grounds with my friends, we decided to visit the exhibition halls.

The exhibits and entrees in halls number one and two at the Durham County Fair were enough to make any county feel proud of her resources. The first exhibit hall was filled with entrees of farm and household products while the second was gaily decorated with booths and displays of the local business uses.

The enormous pumpkins, large potatoes, apples, pears, vegetables and other products were enough to make anyone forget the drought of the past summer, and, also, the present struggle in Europe.

The first thing I saw or heard on entering the exhibition hall number one was beautiful strains of music that came from a piano-player which was placed in this hall by Harris-Butler Co. The W. R. Murray Co. furnished music in the second exhibition hall, with a piano-player. Both were placed in very attractive booths.

The Oconeechee farm, in a very pretty booth, showed almost every kind of grain produced in North Carolina, a variety of fruits, vegetables and other products. The child display from the Lochmoor farm consisted of canned vegetables, jellies, fruits and corn. The cake and bread department were enough to make anyone hungry. The embroidery department was especially good. The booth of the Durham Traction Co. was very attractive and also the booth of the Durham Book and Stationery Co., which had the appearance of the down-town offices.

The Holiday studio exhibited an art collection of oil paintings and photographs. This exhibit was very pleasing to look upon, for you would perhaps see some face you would recognize. The booth containing curios from the Redwood school district was one of the interesting things to be seen. Our school was represented by a map of the Durham county, which took the first prize.

One of the most interesting things to be seen at the fair was the horticultural exhibit, which consisted mostly of fruits, grapes and vines. Also, the booth of Q. E. Rawls' and Son was very unique. This display consisted of articles for Better Babies.

Relay at Trinity

The October number of the South Atlantic Quarterly possesses an element of timeliness in its two articles on the topic of war. The leading article is by Dr. Roland Hughes, of Cornell University, who writes upon the subject: "The Eugenic Judgment of War." This article is a very interesting discussion of the effect of war upon the breed of men. Particular attention is given to the charge of the advocates of peace that war has been in the past the greatest cause of physical deterioration to the human race. Professor William Thomas Laprade, of Trinity college, contributes an able historical review of the causes that have led to the present European war. His article deals with both the fundamental causes and the immediate occasion of the great conflict.
