The republicans of Surry county will hold their convention at Dobson, Saturday, to place a ticket in the field for Senator, Representative, and all county officers. There are quite a number of aspirants for the different places, and a lively time is looked for among the different candidates and their friends.

A German, captured by the Americans last week, was asked what was the impression among the German soldiers about these new forces. The captured man replied that no one among the Germans believed the report that there are a million Americans in France, the general impression being that there are at least ten million of them there right now.

The lumber business is one of the biggest industries of this country at the present time. Every day, from thirty to forty loads of lumber pass our door, going to the various plants in the eastern part of town, where it is eagerly awaited. Thousands of dollars are being paid to the land owners for their timber, and the mill men use every tree from the old field scrub pine to the giant oak of the forest.

The German submarines have come across the Atlantic and are operating along the coast of New York and Massachusetts. Last week the American cruiser San Diego was sunk off the coast of Long Island. She had on board 1,114 officers and men. Three are known to be dead, 47 are missing and 12 unaccounted for. The balance were brought safely to land by rescue boats. Later in the week several smaller vessels were torpedoed along the Massachusetts coast. Of course this is done by the Germans to give the Americans over here a scare and no doubt but what it will have that effect, but it will not last long and the German U-boats will make themselves scarce on this side from now on.

THE GREAT BATTLE.

The great battle that has been expected for some time is now in progress on the battlefields of northern France. The Germans after a wait of a month began their offensive drive on Monday of last week with the hope and expectation of driving back the French and their allies and capturing Paris and the channel ports. All during the week the battle raged at different sectors along the entire front. The allied troops held their ground and drove the Germans back, succeeding in penetrating their lines at a number of points and capturing several towns that had been occupied by them together with several thousand prisoners and large quantities of heavy guns and munitions. At this time heavy fighting is still going on and the British, French and American troops are driving the Germans back at every point and it looks now as if there would be a complete rout of the enemy. It is the general belief that this battle will be the turning point in the war and that peace will soon dawn once more over the land. Let us hope and trust that this may be the result.

SUGAR SITUATION.

The sugar situation has become extremely acute and I am requested to make the following statement:

- 1st. Urge the utmost economy in the use of sugar by all consumers.
- 2nd. Urge the canning of fruits without sugar.
- 3rd. Forbid the sale of any sugar for any purpose, including canning and preserving, in excess of 2 and 5 pound lots except upon certificates approved by the County Food Administrator.
- 4th. Retailers must furnish Food Administrator each week a copy of all sugar sold during the week and the persons to whom sold.
- 5th. Wholesalers should furnish retailers in original packages where possible.
- 6th. No new jobbers or whole salers starting to handle sugar after July 1st, should be given license or certificates.
- 7th. No interim certificates should be issued for the month of August.
- 8th. The supply allowed for July will likely be required to extend throughout August.

The foregoing is received from Washington and I urge all consumers of sugar to use the strictest economy.

DOBSON NEWS.

The rains of last week have all our farmers in high spirits, and if seasons continue corn and to bacco will be the best in years.

Dr. John R. Woltz recently received a letter informing him that his son, Claud, who is stationed at Jacksonville, Fla., has been promoted to the rank of Captain. This makes two promotions for young Woltz in less than a month.

The Republican primary for Dobson township was held here last Saturday. The attendance was said by many to be the largest ever seen in Dobson. While the contest was spirited between several candidates, good order and the best of feeling prevailed. The first candidates to be voted for were W. W. Hampton and S. O. Maguire, for Representative. Hampton received 232 votes and Maguire 30. The next was for Sheriff. Moses Hodges received 125 votes as against 148 for Sheriff Belton. For Register, S. W. Marion received 234 votes against 63 for H. G. Jarrell, 10 for Henry Wolfe and a scattering vote for some of the other candidates. J. A. Jackson received the unanimous endorsement of the convention for Clerk of the Court. A township ticket was nominated and the following delegates were elected to the county convention: Green Clifton, B. G. Nichols, Ira S. Gambill, J. T. Copeland, S. G. Brim, Bob Marion, C. G. Simpson, C. F. Callahan, J. W. Norman, W. M. Jackson, B. W. Snow, C. C. Holyfield, W. C. Key, S. S. Lambert, and R. B. Badgitt. J. R. Wright was elected township chairman for the next two years, after which the convention adjourned. —Cor.
