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We have recently heard considerable complaint about the fish in the rivers and smaller streams of the country being destroyed by saw dust from mills along the streams. Mitchell's river and creeks in Bryan and Elkin townships a few years ago were well stocked with fish, but now there are scarcely any. This, has been caused by saw dust being thrown into the streams which either kills or drives the fish away. This is a violation of the State law and any person guilty lays themselves liable to heavy penalties. We have been asked to call attention to this and advise that unless it is stopped within a short time parties who are guilty will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

The Spring term of Surry court was in session all of last week. Mr. J. S. Atkinson, of Elkin, was foreman of the Grand Jury. Esker Fallin was fined \$50.00 and costs for carrying a pistol. The case of the State against Zello Phillips and a young unmarried woman for adultery occupied all of Tuesday and Wednesday. The jury returned a verdict of guilty and the Judge sentenced Phillips to two years on the roads and the woman six months at the county home. Bud Martin, of Elkin, was tried on the charge of stealing \$300.00 from a blind man here a few weeks ago. The evidence was all circumstantial and the jury rendered a verdict of acquittal. Harrison Norman went into the Court room drunk, with a bottle of liquor in his pocket and the Judge sent him to jail for thirty days.

DOBSON COURT

In this column last week we gave the proceedings of the opening day of court, Tuesday morning many of the State's witnesses who were tardy Monday on account of the erroneous idea that Easter Monday would be observed as a holiday, were present so that work in earnest was begun.

A 13 year old colored boy was brought before the judge charged with house-breaking. It was one of those cases wherein the need of a reformatory is so manifest, and our judges find themselves handicapped in meeting the demands of justice and for the protection of society. The charge was changed to forcible trespass and the defendant discharged with the costs and bond to show good behavior and report to the police officer at Mount Airy. The time of the court for a greater part Tuesday and Wednesday was taken in the case of State vs. Zello Phillips and Mary Key on the charge of F. and A. There was a verdict of guilty, and male defendant received a road sentence and female defendant to County Home.

State vs. Bud Martin, colored, charged with the larceny of \$300 from a blind man named Eller, in Elkin, resulted in a verdict of not guilty, and was the only acquittal during the week.

State vs. J. W. Wall and Mollie Collins on a charge of F. and A. State a nol pros as to Mollie Collins and Wall received a verdict of guilty and 18 months on the roads.

State vs. Roy Denny, charged with the larceny of some buggy whips, was submitted as was also State vs. Ray Denny charged with writing obscene matter on a school house. Judge Bryson took these cases under advisement, and finally imposed a fine of \$100 in each case.

State vs. J. P. Lewis, W. J. Reid and Die Lewis on a charge of assaulting Prof. E. S. Hendren, of Pilot Mountain, who had punished some of the first named defendants' children while they were in school, was taken from the jury, and a nol pros as to J. P. Lewis with fines of \$25 each as to the other defendants.

Samson Jones, who was con-

victed a little more than a year ago on the charge of manufacturing spirituous liquors, was before the court again on a charge for the second offense. Judge Shaw at the former trial gave Jones a 15 month's term at the State's prison, but Jones had money and carried his case to the Supreme court, and falling there, in some way influenced our Governor to turn him loose with a fine of \$250 and costs. This time his brother in law, Ed. Matthews, was indicted with him. After part of the evidence was in, Matthews tendered a plea of guilty, and was released with the costs, but Jones had more faith in his lawyer than he did in the honor of the jury, and allowed that body after brief deliberation, to render a verdict of guilty, upon which he received a sentence of two years in the pen this time.

The criminal docket was finished Saturday and one or two divorce cases were heard. The judge remained over Sunday and the civil calendar was taken Monday. At this writing the case of Chaney vs. Willmouth, a dispute about a boundary line, is being heard.

BIG S. A. DRIVE MAY 19 TO 26

The Salvation Army which played as great part in the world war as any of the organizations that did so much to help our boys in the trenches, the camps and on the battlefields, are now asking the people to help them to carry on the grand work in which they have so long been engaged.

A campaign will be put on in the United States to raise funds for their aid which will cover the period from May 19th to 26th, inclusive. The amount asked for is not large, and has been divided among the different States, and the State allotments apportioned to counties.

The counties have been grouped into zones and a chairman and manager appointed for each zone. Forsyth, Davie, Yadkin, Surry, Wilkes, Alleghany, and Ashe counties form one zone and Mr. Eugene E. Gray is chairman and Mr. W. B. Connelly is manager for this zone with headquarters at Winston Salem. Surry county has been divided into two county zones, the east and west. The west zone is composed of Elkin, Bryan, Marsh, Rockford, Sittim and Shoals townships. Prof. J. H. Allen is chairman and Alex. Chatham, Jr., is treasurer.

He was a Confederate veteran, having served through the entire four years of the civil war under General Stonewall Jackson and was on picket duty the night Jackson was killed. The funeral services were held Tuesday at two o'clock, P. M., in the Flat Rock Baptist church, conducted by Rev. V. M. Swaim, of Winston-Salem, and his body was interred in the church cemetery. He is survived by one sister, eight grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.
