Two or three weeks ago there was appointed a welfare or betterment community committee, composed of representatives from the Merchants Association, one from each church and lodge in the town, whose duties it would be to devise plans, ways and means for the betterment of the town's interests in every way possible. We do not know whether this committee has ever effected an organization or not. One thing we do know, and that is no visible results have yet been shown of any improvements along any line. We don't profess to know what this committee is expected to do, and we are not assuming the roll of dictator, but we want to call attention to just a few things that need to be looked after right now.

First, is our cemetery, the place where our loved ones are quietly resting beneath the sod, while over them weeds, broom sedge and sprouts are growing. Next, we want to call attention to streets and sidewalks. When you get off Main street you will find grass and weeds growing on the sidewalks until it is impossible for a lady to pass over them without getting her shoes and skirts soiled and maybe ruined. Front street has become almost impassible and is being largely used as a cow pasture. The flower garden and grass plat at the depot, instead of a thing of beauty, as it was intended to be, has become almost eyesore. We hope this committee will organize, if they have not already done so, and do something for the uplift of our town and the betterment of conditions in general.

**IMPORTANT TO INCOME TAXPAYERS.**

Collector Watts said today that beginning Monday, June 9th and ending Monday night, June 16th an income tax officer will be at Winston-Salem and Statesville for the purpose of assisting income taxpayers with their final returns, which must be made and at least one half of the tax due paid on or before June 16th.
