A petition asking the special legislature to pass an act allowing Surry county to issue bonds for road purposes was sent here a few days ago from Mount Airy with the request that it be signed by our citizens. A hurry call brought a number of our business men together yesterday who, after considering the pros and cons of the petition, decided to hold it up until a thorough investigation could be made. We think this was a good decision. We have enough bonds outstanding already and are opposed to floating any more unless it is positively necessary.

In discussing daily conditions of the times in which we are living and the fast rate in which everybody and everything are rushing along, we frequently hear some one make the assertion that the world is growing worse every day. The people who inhabit the world are to blame for existing conditions.
