

## "SILVER PINES," NEW GIRLS CAMP AT ROARING GAP OPENS ON NEXT SATURDAY WITH BIG ENROLLMENT

Girls Ranging From 8 To 18 Years From Ten Different States Have Two Months of Camp Life Awaiting Them at Famous Resort. Special Car Bearing Pupils From New York City To Arrive In Elkin Saturday Noon. Mountain Hikes, Water Sports, Tennis, Horseback Riding, Arts and Crafts, Music and Dancing To Be Featured at new Camp Set In Beautiful Pine Forest At Edge Of Lake

Next Saturday will see the official opening of "Silver Pines" the new girls' camp at Roaring Gap and which is destined to become one of the outstanding summer camps in the country. A special Pullman car will bring a group of the girl students to Elkin on the noon train Saturday and they will be met by bus and private cars and taken to the new camp atop the mountain. The special car will come from New York city where many of the students were enrolled. Other students will come the same day from nearer points.

To date thirty six students have been entered coming from New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Georgia, Kentucky, South Carolina and North Carolina. An able faculty is on hand to tutor the girls which will be at Roaring Gap for over two months, the camp ending August 28. While the course will specialize in water sports and riding, other features, such as dancing, tennis, mountain hiking, crafts and arts and music will be featured. The girls at the camp range in age from eight to eighteen.

The camp is complete and modern in every way. The main room consists of the dining room and auditorium and will be the center of the indoor training. A stage is built in the auditorium for plays and entertainment. The students will sleep in the camps which are built in the pine woods facing the lake and each are 14 by 36 feet. Five students sleep in each camp and a counselor is in charge of each one of the groups.

The three directors of the camp are Miss Elizabeth Powe, of Hartsville, South Carolina; Miss Pricilla Shaw, of Sumpter, South Carolina and Miss Julia Patton, of Atlanta, Illinois. The supervisors will be Miss Jean Walsh, of the University of Cincinnati, who will have charge of rhythmic and natural dancing; swimming, life saving and hiking; Miss Elizabeth Cogswell, of the Sargent school of physical educa-

tion and tennis besides, swimming water sports and track; Miss Elizabeth Bruckheimer, of Columbia University, swimming, diving, riding, first aid, life saving, canoeing and hiking; Miss Thalia B. Bennett, of Waterbury Connecticut, supervisor of health and camp nurse; Miss Wylma Mishoe, of the Coker College at Hartsville South Carolina, music, glee club and piano; Miss Virginia Payne, dramatic director and evening recreation; Miss Mary Nostrand of New York, applied arts and crafts; Miss Louise Boles, of Greenwich, Connecticut, assistant head of water sports and Miss Lily Gregg, of Sumpter South Carolina, dietician.

The three Directors of Silver Pines are graduates of the Sargent School of Physical Education in Cambridge, Mass. Miss Patton has had eight years camp experience, first a camper, then Junior counselor at Camp Oneka, Tafton, Pa., assistant head of land and water at Chunnus Cove Camp at Asheville, N. C., Head of Water Sports and Swimming at Wynona, Fairlee, Vt., for 3 years, and Head Counselor and assist. Director at Agawak, Minocqua, Wis., for 2 years. Miss Patton has also been an instructor at Sargent School Camp at Peterboro, N. H. For four years she has been Director of Athletics at Cathedral School of St. Mary, Garden City, Long Island, N. Y. Miss Shaw has been an instructor at Sargent School Camp, Head of Land Sports at Agawak, Minocqua, Wis., and Director of Girl Scout Camp. She has been Supervisor of Physical Education in the Girls High School and Grammar Grades at Sumter, South Carolina for four years. Miss Powe has been engaged in summer camp work in Girl Scout Camps. Silver Pines council staff is made up of young women chosen from many schools and each counselor specially trained for her type of work. Every counselor in charge of a department has had at least two years previous camp experience.

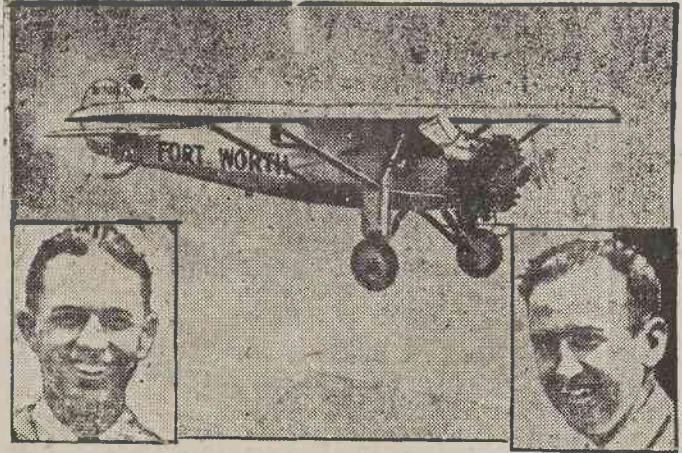

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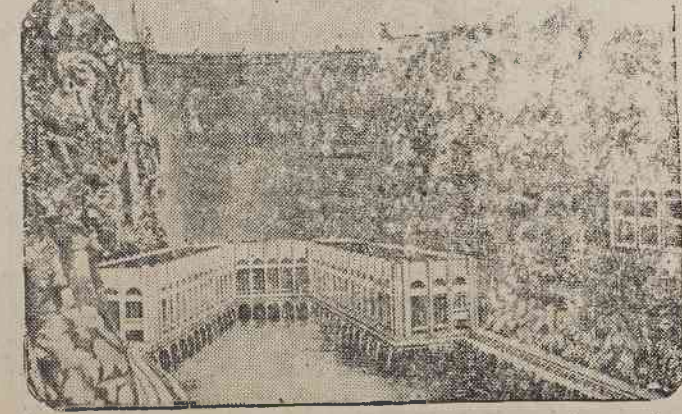



### Fort Worth Novice Flyers Set New Record
