Doughton, former Commissioner for the Seventh Highway District, and built at a cost of \$76,000, which was paid jointly by the North Carolina and Virginia Highway Commissions, Near Roaring Gap.

Yadkin county, under the direction of L. F. Brumfield, county agent, will wage a war on rats on June 27 with the slogan "Keep Yadkin County Free of Rats." A quantity of Red Squill will be mixed and delivered to the following Yadkin coun-

ty places: Norman's Drug Store, Yadkinville; Basketeria, Jonesville; Norman's Grocery, Boonville; Drug Store, East Bend and Garner's Store at Brooks Cross Roads.

The bait will cost fifty cents per farm and will consist of beef and cereal with the poison. Cards have been issued and persons are asked to fill in the application for the bait and mixed portion will be available at the various stores. All persons are asked to get the poison out by dusk on June 27 so that a concerted drive may add to the effectiveness of the campaign.

**PLANT LATE CORN TAYLOR'S ADVISE**

Now that the rush of the planting season is over and farm labor is more leisure, if there is not enough land planted to corn to feed all livestock on the farm and there is likely to be insufficient amount of rough feed on the farm. Why not plant a late patch of corn, for late roasting ears and feed. Corn planted now will likely mature before frost and should it not mature it makes excellent feed cut in the roasting ear stage, and fed to livestock.

In planting this late corn patch a piece of fertile land should be selected if possible, then all the barnyard manure available should be applied, and a liberal amount of fertilizer used. It does not require very much cultivation to make this late corn. The corn can be planted after wheat or oats are harvested. You may say that this is hard on land, to be sure it is hard on land if there is not an application of manure applied, which should be done. But it is hard on the pocket book to buy corn. Especially is this true when tobacco brings a low price. Let's raise enough corn and roughage this year to feed the livestock on the farm.
