No. 1—Do not sell any of your tobacco under any other grower's allotment card until you have finished selling the 80 per cent on your

No. 2-Do not sell your allotment card to a non-contract signer or a grower that made an application for an allotment, as this will violate the contract.

No. 3-The contract signer who produces more than his allotment cannot sell the remainder of his crop by paying the tax, but will have to sell it under some other grower's
