Be it ordained that the owner of each passenger car for hire be and is hereby required to post with the Chief of Police a public liability insurance policy in a good and acceptable company, with a minimum limit of \$5,000/10,000 or in lieu thereof a good and solvent bond approved and accepted by the Mayor. That the operation of any taxi or passenger car for hire within the corporate limits of the Town of Elkin, N. C., on or after January 20, 1936 without having complied with the above requirement, shall con-stitute a misdemeanor and each day on which a taxi or passenger car for hire without insurance or bond as above required shall constitute a separate offense, and the owner thereof shall be fined not more than \$50.00 or imprisoned for not more than 30 days.
