Results of Pre-school Examinations

Total number of children examined, 396; Number having no defects, 64; number having diseased tonsils, 196; number having defective vision, 18; number having defective teeth, 195; number having cardiac defects, 4; number having diseases of the skin, 1; number 10 per cent or more underweight, 37; notices to parents of defects found requiring correction, 244; smallpox immuniza-

tions, 396; diphtheria immunizations, 241.

During the summer months is an ideal time for correction of defects found in the preschool. These defects, such as diseased tonsils, defective teeth, defective vision, etc., should not be neglected. It is highly important that the child should enter school physically fit, as his progress in school may be seriously handicapped because of these defects.

The school health examination is by no means a substitute for medical supervision by the family physician who sees your child in health and sickness and can therefore judge the child's individual needs and potentialities. All that the school physician can be expected to do in the few minutes at his command is to pick out from a large number of children those who are most likely to be in need of further medical care.

Give your child a fair chance in life. One specific duty of the parent is to get his child ready to enter school for the first time,

free of all defects and physical handicaps. A physical defect puts a child at a disadvantage with his schoolmates. Poor sight or hearing may cause him to seem dull in school and cause him to become discouraged and disinterested. The first step in getting ready to take his place well equipped with other children is a thorough physical examination by a physician and dentist. Delay is costly not only from a material standpoint but physically as well.

The above is an abbreviated form of privilege taxes levied by the Town of Elkin for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1937, and further be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Elkin that any person or persons, firms or corporations, carrying on business upon which a license tax has been imposed, or may be imposed by the Commissioners of the Town of Elkin, without first obtaining license to carry on said business, as prescribed by the ordinances, shall be fined \$50.00 for every offense or confined or imprisoned for a term of not more than thirty days, or both, provided that after the conviction the fine may be reduced to the sum of not less than \$25.00; provided further, that each and every day said business is carried on without license therefor shall be considered a separate and distinct offense and indictable, and further that said license is non-transferable.
