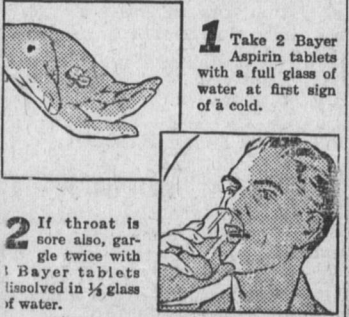
### NOTICE OF SALE UNDER DEED OF TRUST
