

### WAYNICK SILENT REGARDS FUTURE

#### Retiring Highway Chairman Will Make No Comment Pending Conference

#### F. L. DUNLAP SUCCESSOR

Raleigh, April 25. — Capus M. Waynick, retiring chairman of the state highway and public works commission, said today he had no comment to make at present on plans for the future.

Waynick, whose successor, Frank L. Dunlap, now assistant director of the budget, was announced yesterday said:

"I have enjoyed the work of the past two years. It (the highway department) is a very fine organization. As to the question of other employment by the state, I won't have any statement until I talk with the governor."

Governor Hoey, in announcing the appointment of Waynick's successor and 10 new members of the highway commission, said the retiring chairman had been tendered the position of director of the division of purchase and contract at \$6,000 a year, the same salary he now receives.

Dunlap, the governor said, will get \$7,500 a year. He and the new commissioners will take office May 1.

Mrs. Vetra Hendren of Wilkesboro and Mrs. Hazel Adams of Booneville, survive.

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### MANY CHILDREN ILLEGALLY IN JAIL

#### Report of Penal Division Says Confinement of Youngsters Has Proved Problem

#### SEAWELL GIVES RULING

Raleigh, April 26.—The division of institutions and corrections reported today that 149 children under 16 years of age had been confined, many "illegally," in 39 county jails at some time during March, though 50 counties reported no children in their jails.

Fifty of the 149 children were under 14 years of age and two were only eight years old, the report said.

Seven of the children were listed as being held for "drunk and disorderly" and three for "violating liquor laws."

The report said the attorney general had ruled "it is not legal to confine a child in jail unless the child is as much as 14 years old and is charged with commission of a felony. It is apparent that the majority of the 149 children were illegally confined in the jails."

"The problem," the report said, "is not merely one of legal or illegal practice, but rather a question of what constitutes good social practice."

Better co-ordination of law enforcement and social work efforts was urged.

sheriff. The investigation was then begun and Sparks arrested.

The best information obtainable, however, is that the two men involved and some others were all drinking from a five gallon container furnished by Speaks and all well along with their drinks. About night Speaks and Sparks began an argument over the woman and the fight was on. Speaks received several bad bruises and cuts on the head, one of which showed that some instrument had struck him on the temple and raged down under the skin an inch. One of those present stated that it was suggested that Speaks be carried home but Vestal Sparks objected to him being taken in his car because of his bleeding and it is thought Speaks was left on the ground until he regained consciousness and walked to his home a short distance away at two o'clock in the morning.

Robert Myers, who lives with Speaks, says that Speaks came stumbling in home alone at 2 A. M. covered with blood.

Vestal Sparks, in talking to a Elkin Tribune representative yesterday, stated that Jonah Speaks knocked him down and jumped on him and that he was fighting in self defense. He admits striking him with the pliers and also admits drinking some that afternoon. Others who witnessed the fight, or part of it, were Gurnie Ashley, Mary Jarvis, Ida Mitchel and the woman the fight was over.

#### The Prisoner

Sparks is a fair looking young man, 29, and says he was never in trouble before. He is a son of Elizabeth Sparks, who lives in that section, and the late Sylvester Sparks. He is not married.

His preliminary trial will be this morning before Magistrate E. G. Myers, who, it is understood, will call in another local justice to sit with him. Sparks will be represented by Attorney Eugene Trivette of North Wilkesboro.

#### Jonah E. Speaks

Jonah Speaks comes from a family of fighters. He is a nephew of Moses Speaks, who killed his wife, daughter and son-in-law, all the same time in High Point about 25 years ago. Jonah has been mixed up in the courts a number of times, but most seriously when he was tried here with two other men on a charge of kidnapping and assaulting a young girl for which each one was sent to state prison for ten years.

After serving about half of his term Jonah was paroled and came back to his old haunts in upper Yadkin and "Scuffletown." Pretty soon he was drinking. On one occasion he beat up a bunch of men, all he could catch, and ran Lee Trivette home with a shotgun. This was reported to the Governor and his parole revoked. He was carried back to prison and finished his term, returning home about a year ago. In the meantime his wife had died, but he has five children living, three boys and two girls. The boys are Vivian, Leonard and Jonah E. Speaks, Jr. The girls are named Artha and Annie Lee, and are married but their last names could not be learned. The children are said to be hard working people and have had no trouble with the law.
