## PAUL COCHRANE IS IN FAIRMONT FOR SEASON

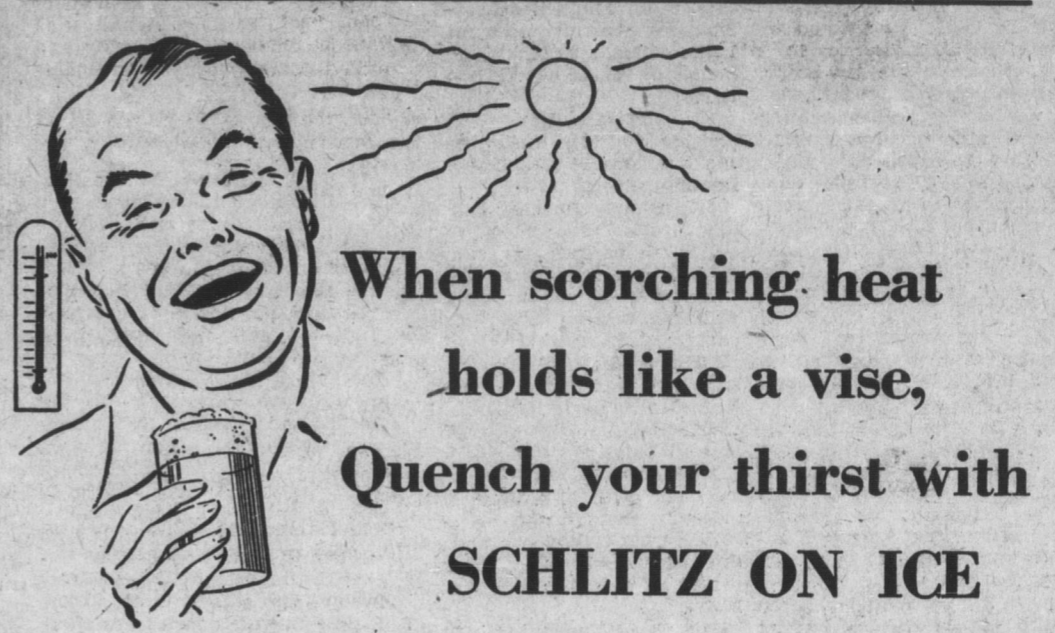
