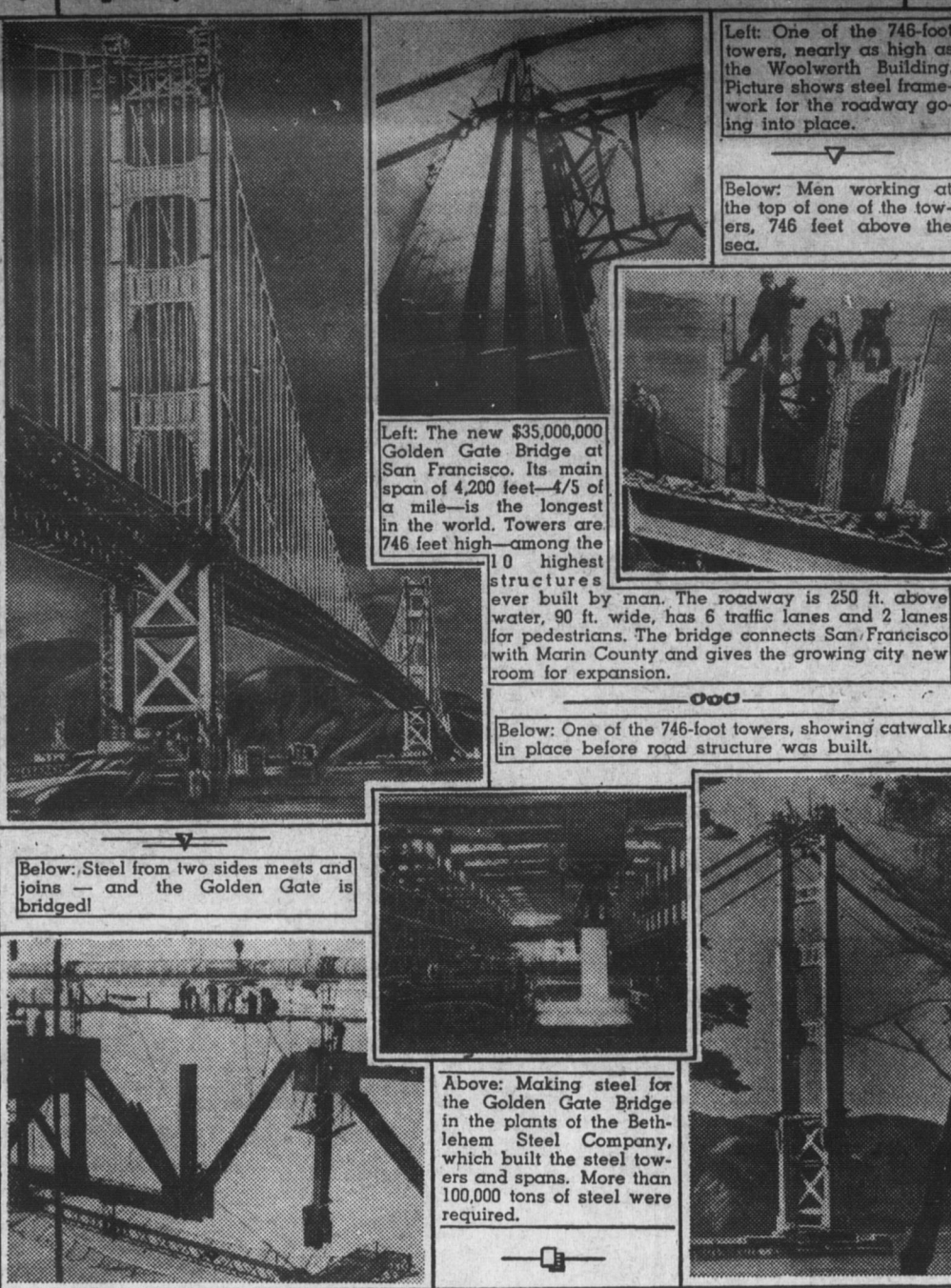

## Golden Gate Bridge, World's Longest Suspension Span, Formally Dedicated At San Francisco

Left: The new \$35,000,000 Golden Gate Bridge at San Francisco. Its main span of 4,200 feet—4/5 of a mile—is the longest in the world. Towers are 746 feet high—among the 10 highest structures ever built by man. The roadway is 250 ft. above water, 90 ft. wide, has 6 traffic lanes and 2 lanes for pedestrians. The bridge connects San Francisco with Marin County and gives the growing city new room for expansion.
