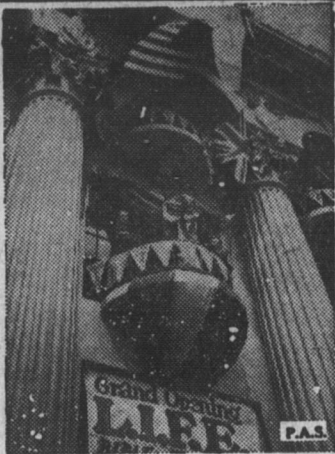
Third Quarterly Meeting of Methodist W. M. S. Is Held
