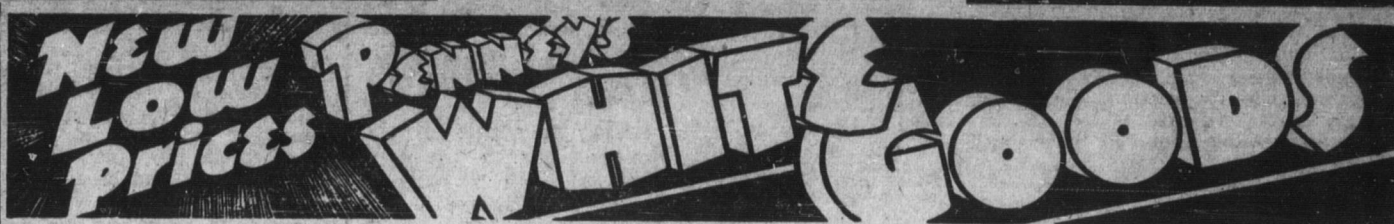
by the anxieties of their hearts. And the church, which is Christ's continuing ministry in the world of today cannot be indifferent to the physical need of the world around it.

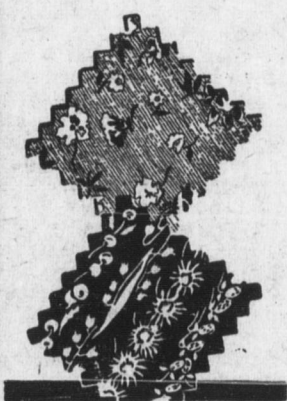

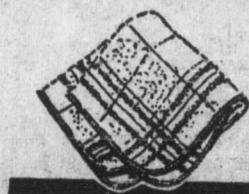

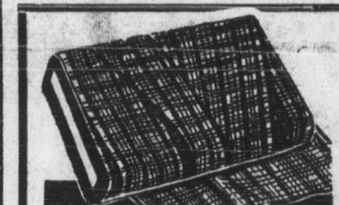
