Mrs. C. O. Robinson, who has spent the past three months in

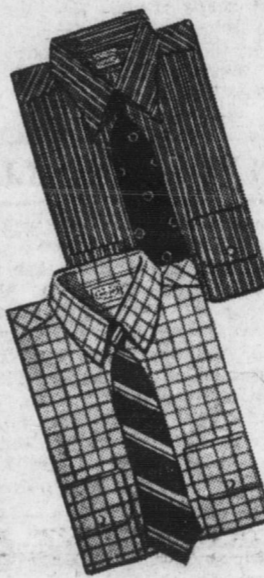
