TOGETHER WITH other sheriffs and coroners in the 100 counties of North Carolina, Sheriff Harvey Boyd and Dr. R. E. Smith, coroner, are serving four-year terms, and there will be no election for sheriff or coroner until 1942. The decision on two- or four-year terms for sheriffs and coroners because of a constitutional amendment voted in 1938, was handed down Friday by the North Carolina supreme court. The ruling had been anxiously awaited by political leaders.



Unless Economic Recovery Can Be Attained

GUEST OF KIWANIANS

Thurmond Chatham, James G. Hanes and Other Prominent Men Present

REVENUE SOURCE CITED

The American system of gov ernment faces a breakdown unless economic recovery, the basic problem confronting the United States, can be attained, John W. Hanes, former undersecretary of the United States treasury, told members of the Elkin Kiwanis club and their guests last Thursday night.

Widely discussed as likely to be drafted for the vice-presidential ticket, the former treasury executive gave his listeners a peek at the federal tax structure from the viewpoint of one who knows it from the inside, giving a technical analysis of the nation's tax problem. He said that the budget must be balanced either by levying new taxes, reducing expenditures, or a combination of these two ideas

A large gathering greeted Mr. Hanes, who styled himself a member of the "unemployed," but designated his permanent address as Elkin, N. C."
