Ray Morgan, a distinguished New York portrait and poster artist, created the design, which emphasizes the keynote that the Red Cross "serves humanity."

## Red Cross Roll Call To Begin Here Nov. 12

The Elkin branch of the American Red Cross will begin its annual Roll Call here next Tuesday, November 12. It has been announced by local Red Cross officials.

Mrs. A. O. Bryan will be in charge of the drive, and urges that everyone contribute to the work of the organization by joining.

She pointed out that due to unsettled conditions both in America and abroad caused by the acts of aggressor nations, the Red Cross faces a severe task during the coming winter months.

It was also stated that the local Red Cross is a real factor for helpfulness here at home, a majority of funds being spent in our own community.

No one, when asked to join this great organization when the drive starts next week should fail to take advantage of their opportunity for good, it was said.

A report of the activities of the local organization for the past year, just announced, discloses that the Red Cross had done excellent work in caring for unfortunates in this community. In the list are to be found clothing and food for the aged and needy, first aid supplies for schools of North Elkin, Elkin Elementary and Elkin colored, fuel for needy families and many other worthwhile activities.

It was also disclosed that war relief contributions of May 24, 1940, to October 26, 1940, amounted to \$496.60. This sum was remitted to the national organization out of a total of \$555.66 collected. A total of \$3.93 was used for local expenditures for materials, and a balance amounting to \$55.13, is now on hand.

Production of the organization was announced as follows: 28 women's sweaters, 2 men's sweaters, 4 children's sweaters, 6 beanies, 3 shawls, 16 pairs booties, 9 layettes supplie (five were made by Devotion). Additional sweaters are in process of being made.

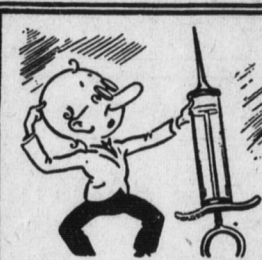

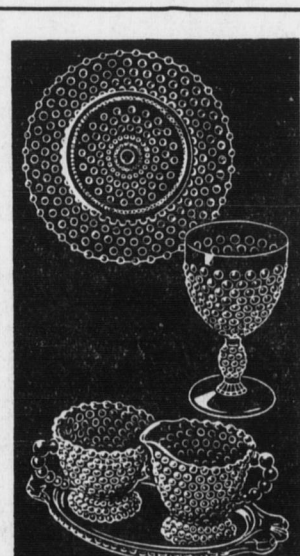
