

In the list are to be found clothing and food for the aged and needy, first aid supplies for schools of North Elkin, Elkin Elementary and Elkin colored, fuel for needy families and many other worthwhile activities. It was also disclosed that war relief contributions of May 24 to October 26, 1940, 1940, amounted to \$496.60. This sum was remitted to the national organization out of a total of \$555.66 collected. A total of \$3.93 was used for local expenditures for materials, and a balance, amounting to \$55.13, is now on hand. Production of the organization was announced as follows: 28 women's sweaters, 2 men's sweaters, 4 children's sweaters, 6 beanies, 3 shawls, 16 pairs bootees 9 layettes supplie (five were made by Devotion). 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
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
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
