The survey to determine the advisability of operating the State-owned Yadkin county lime mine at Lime Rock, will begin today (Thursday) it has been announced by Ben L. Prince, chairman of the State Highway and Public Works Commission, following a conference of the local committee, with state officials, in Raleigh Monday.

Dr. A. F. Greaves-Walker, of State College, who has been selected to do the work, accompanied by Mr. Prince, will start the survey at the mine today, which will require two or three days.
