Mrs. Shinault, the only candidate in Surry to announce for office to date, has been acting register of deeds since Kermit Lawrence was inducted into service in the navy last fall.

Surry voters will have opportunity to elect candidates for only five offices this year. In addition to register of deeds, candidates for commissioners, house of representatives, coroner and surveyor must be named.

Thus far, no one has announced for any office other than for register of deeds. However, several statements are expected within the near future.

Ignore Heavy Losses In Attempt To Push Fifth Army Into The Sea

TRADE HEAVY BLOWS

Allied Headquarters, Naples. March 8.—German tanks and troops were reported regrouping under constant Allied fire today for a new drive against the Anzio beachhead, while Fifty Army forces on the Cassino front traded increasingly heavy blows with Nazi gunners and combat patrols. Bitter patrol clashes and artillery exchanges raged on all the main battle sectors, but an Allied communique said deep snows in the mountains and mud in the lowlands made all troop movements difficult and there were no major changes in the front lines. Reports from the beachehad front indicated, however, that the nue will be at the Elkin City Hall Nazi commanders, undeterred by
