## **REPORT MANY FIGHTERS**


London, March 15. - Heavy bombers of the United States Eighth Air Force resumed their daylight offensive against Germany today after a three-day lull, and the Berlin radio said they fought a big battle with the Nazi defense planes over the Hannover area.

Strong squadrons of American fighters shepherded the four-motored bombers striking into Germany for the first time since the bombardment Saturday of Muenster, transport and industrial center of the northwest Reich. The first official announcement of the daylight attack said a me-


