The Victory bond drive which has been in progress locally for a little less than two weeks has netted so far \$63,151 of Surry's E-Bond quota of \$454,000, according to Miss Mattie Mae Powell, chairman of the Elkin drive.

Miss Powell expressed some disappointment in the speed with which Elkin is reaching its quota, although it is beleived that with the opportunity of giving bonds for Christmas just around the corner, the sales figures will attain new heights in a short while.

The present drive is the last one. Officials urge every citizen to buy just as many Victory bonds as they possibly can, as the money is needed to help carry out the program for which the boys have sa gallantly and sacrifically given their best. It has been pointed out that your largest possible, loan will be small in comparison to their services.

To Be Held At Courthouse In **Dobson Friday**

Former Governor of North Carolina, Hon. J. Melville Broughton will address a county-wide meeting of the Surry Farm Bureau Federation in the Court House in Dobson on Friday evening, November 23, at 7:30. The popularity of the "Governor," as he is known to Surry Farmers, is expected to draw a packed Court House of tobacco growers and citizens. The announcement of this meeting was made today by officers of the Farm Bureau.

President and secretary of the Surry Farm Bureau, S. H. Atkinson, of Siloam, and P. N. Taylor, of White Plains, jointly extend the invitation to all farmers of the county as well as to business men who are interested in keeping up tobacco prices in the postwar period. Bureau leaders are especially urging tobacco warehousemen, bankers, and members of the press to attend.
