Dr. Hiatt will continue to devote a greater part of his time during April and May to completion of his work as Western North Carolina conference executive secretary of the Methodist College Advance. However, beginning June 1, he will devote his entire time to the local hospital and will make his home here.

In the meantime the work of the general superintendency will be divided between Dr. Hiatt, Dr. Abernethy, who was instrumental in the building of the hospital and who served as superintendent for 11 years; Dr. Harry L. Johnson, surgical superintendent, and Dr. Vernon W. Taylor, medical superintendent.


