Elkin Township Goes Heavily **Democratic**

On the basis of unofficial and as yet partly incomplete returns, all Democratic candidates for office within Surry County appear to have been successful in their bids for election. With reports in from all but one or two of the county's 18 precincts Republicans have been forced to concede de-

The largest number of votes drawn by a single candidate were pulled down by John Folger, candidate for re-election to Congress. Mr. Folger polled, 5,434 in his home county, while his Republican opponent, S. E. Hall, drew

Unofficial returns are complete from all but Marsh, where no figures have been reported at all; Mount Airy No. 5, where only the results of the Congressional and Sheriff races have been reported; Shoals, where no figures are available as yet on the State senate and State house races; and Westfield, which has not yet reported results of the Congressional race.

John Llewellyn, chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Surry county, said yesterday that the vote in all precincts seemed to be slightly heavier than is usual for off-year elections. Other observers expressed mild surprise at the number of Republican ballots cast in some of the precincts.
