The hearing will give any voters opposing the plan an opportunity to register their objections, and will also serve to clarify any phases of the proposed bond issue that voters wish discussed.



Dobson voters were almost unanimous in re-electing Frank Freeman as their mayor in a town election Monday, but indicated a wide range of choices for members of the town board of commissioners.

J. Herman Coe, Frank W. Comer, Mrs. P. B. Folger, F. B. Madison and John Allen Snow were elected as commissioners in a close race involving nine contestants. John Allen Snow and Mrs. P. B. Folger polled 64 votes each to edge out R. B. Blackwelder, who received 60 votes. Grady Cooper and Walter Blevins received 50 and 36 votes, respectively.

Frank W. Comer polled 86 votes, the highest number of any candidate. Mayor Freeman and J. Herman Coe each received 84 votes.
